As yet chiefly hardwoods are treated because when rendered imper vious to decay, their superior strength enables them to resist mechanical wear for s longer period than softwoods. But the oftwords or conifers, can be rendered ust as resistant to decay, and when tieplates are more commonly used to pre vent wear of ties, such softwoods will, on account of their cheapness and abundance supersede the expensive and rapidly diminishing hardwoods.

Radium Emanation in Medicine

The distinguished English surgeon, Sir rederick Treves, recently stated that radium enamation is just as effective for enrative purposes as radium itself. Assuming that radium is really the valuable therapeutic agent which it appears to be, the announcement is of great importance. Radium is extremely precious, for a small mantity of radium can produce practical y an unlimited amount of very cheap emanation. Radium emanations contained in sealed metal applicators are being sent off daily to all parts of England for medical men to use on their patients who cannot attend the Radium Institte, In space of ten days emanations equal in arative value to \$86,090 worth of radium have been sent out. Radium emits three ets of rays, designated respectively by the Greek letters, "alpha," "beta" and "gamma." The first two destroy the healthy tissues of the hody when directed at close range, and at greater distance stimulate the abnormal tissues of tumors to renewed growth. The "gamma" rays are those which are desired. The more or less undesirable "alpha" and "beta" ray, are filtered out by lead screens, thru which the hard "gamma" radiations pass
