A wave of crime of a particularly atrocious nature is sweeping over Ontario. In the news of a single day are recorded three terrible murders.

At Ottawa the body of Charles Robinson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., a bookmaker's clerk, was found under a pile of coke in a vacant lot.

At Brantford a 12-year-old boy was almost beheaded by a maniac. The body, backed to pieces after death, was found in a wayside ditch.

In Essex, near Windsor, the mutilated body of an unknown woman was found in a cornfield.

There is no clue to the perpetrators of the Ottawa and Essex crimes, but an arrest on suspicion is reported in connection with the Brantford murder.

The boy's name was Chas. Dawson and the Indian suspect James Taylor.

The late Mrs. Trousdale

In the township of Woodhouse, on Sunday, September 7, 1913, Mrs. Jane Trousdale passed to her rest, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Elisha Farr, after a short illness at the ripe age of 85 years, 5 months and 16 days. The funeral took place from her home in the township of Walpole on Tuesday, September 9, at 2.30 o'clock, service being conducted at the house and at the Methodist Church, Jarvis, by her pastor, Rev. J. G. Foots. Interment took place in the Methodist church cemetery. She was the relict of the late Wm. Trousdale, and was born in Durham county, England. Deceased came to this country when she was twenty-two years of age, after a stormy passage, being shipwrecked on the banks of Newfoundland, but after an eventful time she arrived at her destination in the township of Walpole, remaining with her brother, John Bousfield, for three years. She was married and settled down on the farm where she resided until her death. She leaves a family of children and grandchildren to mourn her demise.

In religion she was a Methodist, joining the Methodist church, Jarvis, shortly after her marriage. She continued to the end a member of the church, bearing clear testimony at the end of her abiding trust in His service.
