Fewer Murders

Ottawa, Ont.—During the year, so far only seventeen convictions for the crime of murder have been brought to the attention of the Department of Justice, through whose hands all capital cases must pass for disposition. This would indicate that there will be a marked decrease in the crime for the whole year, the number of last year being in the neighborhood of forty. The Fall Assizes throughout the Dominion will of course add to the present number of seventeen, but it is not considered likely that last year's record will be reached. Of the seventeen cases considered this year, eleven are of commutation of sentence has been extended in the case of several, while a few are still more under consideration. Notable among these is that of Charles Gibson of Toronto, to whom a reprieve was granted until Oct. 9 on an application for a new trial.

Dunnville, Wellandport, &
Beausville Railway

The Dunnville, Wellandport and Beausville electric railway will shortly take on a new lease of life. For some time the construction of the line has been hanging fire, so to speak, due to a condition of finances, but a determined effort is now being made by the company to sell the balance of the bonds and resume work on the line. The effort has been so far successful, and an official statement is expected that work would be again started near the village of St. Ann, in a week or two. The bond issue now being offered for sale is \$200,000. Under the capitalization the common stock is \$400,000, with a bonding power of \$30,000 per mile. Under the act of incorporation the line has running rights from Port Dover village on the North of Lake Erie to St. Catharines with branch lines to Port Maitland, Welland and Jordan. The line crosses the section of the Niagara Peninsula not served by a railway and connects the two great lakes. It also crosses and will have connection with five steam railways.—Grand Trunk, Wabash, Michigan Central, Canadian Pacific, and Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo. From Port Dover the line runs in a northeasterly direction through the village of Nanticoke, Sel Kirk, South Rainham, Rainham, South Cayuga, and Byng, crossing the Grand River into the town of Dunnville. A branch line runs from Dunnville to Port Maitland at the mouth of the river on Lake Erie. The main line continues in a north easterly direction, through Maitland to Wellandport, and at this point the line branches off to Welland, going through the villages of Boyle and Fenwick en route. After leaving Wellandport the course of the main line is north through Elmsford, St. Ann, and Spring Creek to Beausville, thence it runs due east to St. Catharines, passing through Vineland and Jordan. At the latter village a branch extends out to Jordan Harbor. One of the most important divisions of the line is that connecting Dunnville with the T. H. & B. at St. Ann, the construction of this section being well advanced, there being thirteen miles now graded and ties distributed along about twelve miles. The bridges and other structural work are practically completed, the design of construction having been approved by the government and a board. It is for the equipment and completion of this section, that the present bond offering is being made.—Haldimand Advocate.
