Giazed Sweet Potatoes.

For 6 large sweet potatoes make a syrup of 1 cup of sugar, 3 tablespoons of butter and half a cup of water. Boil 3 minutes. Wash the potatoes and boil them for 15 minutes in salted water. Drain, peel and cut in half. lengthwise, and put them in the syrup. being careful to have all the potatoes coated with the syrup. Turn all into buttered pan and bake 15 minutes, basting often. Should be served in pan in which they were baked, and each serving should be covered with syrup.

Cooling by Flame.

It is hard to appreciate that fire has widely different degrees of heat, for every burning blaze seems to have the extreme heat of fire, yet the flame of burning alcohol is actually used for cooling purposes in one make of searchlight because the alcohol flame is not nearly so hot as the point of fire at the centre of the searchlight.

A good searchlight needs to have its lamp as small as possible, and the nearer it is to just a point of light. though still having intense light, the farther can its beams be thrown. The culy way to congregate the light is to raise the degree of heat of the light source, such as an electric arc, but intense heat is likely to result in melting the whole apparatus.

Old Time English Recruiting.

Recruiting in the great war which ended in the fall of Nayoleon was a vastly different matter from that which prevalls to-day. Take the militia act of 1803, for instance. In each subdivision of a county a list was made of all men between the ages of 18 and 45, classified into (a) those under 30 and without children, (b) over that age, (c) men with no children under 14, (d) men with only one child under 14 and (s) all others, if the men required equaled the number in the first or second or any set of consecutive clases they were taken. If not, all the names were put in a bag and drawn until the requisite number was obtained. Any balloted man could purchase exemption for five years on paying a fine of \$50, raised to \$75 in 1503, the money being paid for a substitute. The men paying fines were exempted from the second ballet, and the money was devoted to enabling the men in the second ballot to obtain substitutes. - On this vicious principle the only man really obliged to serve was the poor man drawn in the first ballot.—Dundee Advertiser.

PERSONAL WARRIES.

Huge Dreadnoughts Can be Taken Clear Out of Water.

Among the greatest engineering marvels of to-day are the gigantie floating docks owned by the British Admiralty and utilized for the repair of naval vessels. The higgest type of these docks has a minimum lifting capacity of 32,000 tons, and is capable of lifting a battleship like H.M.S. Lion, which displacement over 30,000 tons, high and dry out of the water to a height of 36 feet in three hours and ten minutes, thus permitting every part of the vessel's hull to be accessible.

Some idea of the labor involved in the construction of one of these huge docks may be gathered from the fact that whereas a first class warship takes about two and a half years to built, it takes two or three times as long to construct a fleating dock of a size sufficient to receive the vessel. A floating dock may be likened to a box with neither ends nor lid. It

is built of steel throughout, the largest type having a length of 680 feet and a width of 144 feet, while the walls are 60 feet in height. The dock is first submerged by ad-

mitting water into the ballast tanks. of pentoons forming the base of the structure. When it has been sunk to a sufficient depth to receive the vessel the latter is warped into its correct position on the keel blocks of the dock, and is then made fast. Powerful pumps are set to work to eject water from the pontoons, causing the structure to rise gradually with its burden. To lift a battleship the size of the Lion 46,000 tons of water has to be pumped out of the pontoons. So perfectly, however, are these huge floating docks constructed that one man can control every movement from what is known as the valve house. which is at the end of the side walls.
