## War Stamps

The Post Office Department at Ottawa has issued the following additional information about war stamps:

The Post Office Department, having given notice a week or two ago, in connection with the War Revenue Act, that all letters and postcards mailed in Canada for delivery in Canada, the United States and Mexico, and letters mailed in Canada for delivery in the United Kingdom and British possessions generally, or wherever the two cent rate applied, should in addition to ordinary postage carry a one cent stamp as a War Tax, and also having notified the public that such war tax which it should be paid preferably by the postage stamp, marked "War Tax" could, if such stamp were not available, be paid by an ordinary one cent postage stamp, is now issuing further notice to the effect that postage stamps may be used for the prepayment of war duties on bank cheques, bills of exchange, promissory notes, express money orders, proprietary or patent medicines, perfumery, wines or champagne, as well as upon letters and telegrams, postal notes and post office orders, the intention being to provide facilities in those portions of the country where excise stamps are not readily available. This in view of the fact that postage stamps may be obtained at all points over the whole country, in many places where there is no collector of Inland Revenue and no Inland Revenue stamps could be available, and no doubt will be largely taken advantage of.

## Laymen's Missionary Banquet

Messrs. Gashy and Ross,  
of Toronto, Spoke.

The Laymen's Missionary Banquet held in the Methodist Church Sunday School rooms last Friday evening was an evening of unusual success. Owing to the inclement weather the attendance was not as large as was hoped for, but what was lacking in hearers was more than fully made up in the addresses.

Dr. Wm. Jacques, M. P. P. for Haldimand, in his usual and fitting manner occupied the chair, and in a short patriotic speech on the "Call of the Empire" delighted his hearers, putting them in harmony for the speakers following.

Mr. Ross, Toronto, Secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Society, of the Anglican Church, was the first speaker to catch the attention of his hearers. He took for his subject, the "World-Wide Movement" entering his remarks on the conflict in white Great Britain is engaged, he said this war was a war in which the forces of Civilization and Christianity were arrayed against barbarism. The calling of the Kaiser, taken from a spiritual standpoint was trying to put the world back into barbarism. The Kaiser's chief plan was to cause the natives of the Orient, aided by the power of the government of Great Britain, but owing to England's policy and the force of Christianity, his efforts were futile. Britain, he said, would never have weathered the storm, if her policy had not been as Christianity as it could possibly be. Speaking of the force and power that Christianity is gaining in the foreign field, he gave his hearers examples the opium traffic and how it was stamped out; the spread of learning in Japan and lately China; the spread of the teachings of Christ through all the Oriental classes; the absolute failure of the Holy War which was engineered by the German diplomacy, of the natives of India, Persia, Russia, Japan, etc., for the success of the Allies; and numerous other examples, all due to the influence of Christianity. From these few instances we need have no fear of the stumbling block to Christianity, but rather we should take courage and double our efforts to greater achievement.

What is the call of the Church? A twofold one, namely, "The Call of Service." Through the agency of men and women in the power of Christ extended. The only power that will ever release the world is the influence of the living God and unless the people suffer the missionaries the work will not be done. If the people of these civilized countries, Christ, how much more do the foreigners need Him. Secondly, "Larger Sacrifice." If fathers and mothers give their sons and daughters to the call of the Empire, how much more should they be willing to give them to the Church of God will have new and sufficient power to solve the problem which confront it.

Mr. Ross was followed by Mr. Gashy, Toronto, Secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Society, undenominational, who took for his subject the "Home Missions."

He said: Two out of three of the people are not professing Christians. How many people in Canada can say "I did what I could to save the children from sin." Four dollars are spent for advertising on every emigrant coming into Canada. How much do for them when we get them here? Two out of every three persons in our churches are not giving anything at all. Our churches are likened unto power houses, being built for service. When the service or power is cut off the church becomes dead. Service is not limited to the church of Christ. We must take it into education, which will enable us to pass it on. Business, too, must be for service, by administering to the needs of the directors of the establishment. Britain's fight will bring new things for the world and she would have no claim for Canada and her colonies if her fight and policy were not entirely unselfish.

The chief call of the Empire is for men and money, so it is the same with the church, which is the chief and most important call. And so his talk ran on, and as in the case of Mr. Ross, electrifying by descriptions, and holding his hearers, which lack of space will not permit us to relate.

After Mr. Gashy's address, Mr. J. J. Parsons, in a short and able address, extended a hearty vote of thanks to the speakers who gave the evening's entertainment. The vote of thanks was seconded by A. Rodgers. Short addresses were given by Revs. Whitclaw, of Hagersville; Ross and McCrimmon, of Jarvis, who expressed their deep appreciation at hearing two such excellent addresses, which touched them so deeply.

Too much credit cannot be given to the ladies of the church who so beautifully provided for the wants of those present.
