The Hydro Electric And What it Costs.

Will Jarvis have Hydro? Peo ple who are talking Hydro and wondering whether Jarvis will ever have hydro or not will be interested in the following figures as given to a Record reporter by Dr. Jaques, who was in Toronto on Tuesday, and while there visited the offices of the Hydro Commission and obtained the following interesting figures .-

Power-For an 11 hr. service, 7a. m. to 6 p.m., provided we take at least 60 h. p., \$31 per horse power. Light for an ordinary house, about \$18. Or from \$12 to \$24, according

to size of house and economy of the consumer. It will cost about \$25 to properly wire the average house, by an expert, which will pass inspection.

Street lamps will cost from \$12 to to \$14 per lamp per year for 100 wat lamp, provided 40 lamps are contracted for by town. If used for cooking purposes, th

estimated cost is \$1.00 per member of family each month. This will vary according to your uses. The estimated debentures required to be issued will be \$5,250.00, this to include, transformer station, poles

etc. Above prices are conservative es-

timates for a small village such as 10114 1813 Jarvis. Should Jarvis be fortunate enough to secure good gas, there is a strong possibility that Hydro will not be considered, but in the event of no gas or continued poor gas the Hydro may become a live question.
