Thick of Fight in France. .

KILLED-PTE. GEO. E. KING.

The first volunteer from Haldiman to be killed at the front was private England, on April 12th, to Mr. and George Edward King of Dunnville Mrs. Dr. Hewson (nee Lily Hodges) who was killed in action on the 31st of March. The deceased, who had no relatives in this country, was about 22 years of age, He had worked on the farm of Enoch Honsberger, South Cayuga, before going to Dumwille, where he was employed with the Deminion Hammock Manf. Co. He was an active member of Court Haldim Canadian Order of Foresters, in which he held the office of Conductor, and was popular with a large circle of friends. His parents lived at Gorles-

ton-on-Sea, England. LIEUT. C.D. BRANT.

Lieut. Cameron D. Brant, who has been reported killed, was an offi of the 4th battalion. He was formally an officer of the 37th Haldimen Rifles and was attached to E. Company, which has its head quarters at Selkirk. He was gazetted as an ficer at the outbreak of the war. Aur. 1. 1914. He did not go with the first Contingent; but awnited a call which came through Capt. Healey, the jutant of the 13th Royal Regiment The latter had a message from the militia department ordering Lieut. D. Brant to report at Montreal. He left at once and on his arrival in England was forwarded to the 4th battalion. He is a grandson of General Brant, the famous Indian warrior.
