Haldimand Boys In Roll of Honor

37th Haldimand Rifles Volunteers in Thick of Fight in France.

KILLED

PTE. GEO. E. KING. The first volunteer from Haldimand to be killed at the front was private George Edward King of Dunnville, who was killed in action on the 31st of March. The deceased, who had no relatives in this country, was about 22 years of age. He had worked on the farm of Enoch Hoesberger, South Cayuga, before going to Dunnville, where he was employed with the Dominion Hamack Meat Co. He was an active member of Court Haldimand Canadian Order of Foresters, in which he held the office of Conductor, and was popular with a large circle of friends. His parents lived at Gortleton-on-Sea, England.

LIEUT. C. D. BRANT.

Lieut. Cameron D. Brant, who has been reported killed, was an officer of the 4th battalion. He was formerly an officer of the 37th Haldimand Rifles, and was attached to E. Company, which has its headquarters at Selkirk. He was gassed as an officer at the outbreak of the war, Aug. 1, 1914. He did not go with the first contingent, but awaited a call which came through Capt. Healey, the Adjutant of the 13th Royal Regiment. The latter had a message from the militia department ordering Lieut. D. Brant to report at Montreal. He left at once and on his arrival in England was forwarded to the 4th battalion. He is a grandson of General Brant, the famous Indian warrior.

Capt. Harold B. Boyd, M. D., who is reported wounded in France, is a son of Rev. Thomas and Mrs. Boyd, of Ridgeway, Ont.
