Miss Bowly Goes to France

Local Nurse to Administer to the Soldiers at the Front.

Miss Annie Bowly, daughter of Mr. Frank Bowly, of Woodhouse, a well known and popular nurse of this county, left on Friday last for Toronto where she has enlisted her services to go to France with the Red Cross Society to take up the work of caring for the sick and wounded soldiers in the great war. Miss Bowly is the first nurse from this county to get away with the Red Cross workers, and her many friends will wish her God speed on her patriotic errand of mercy.

At the Monday afternoon meeting of the Daughters of the Empire, Miss Bowly's departure was taken cognizance of and a telegram of appreciation of her splendid work in the order sent after her.

In making their fifth donation of \$100 each to the Red Cross Society the local order decided to establish two cots in the Duchess of Connaught Canadian Hospital in England, and call one the Annie Bowly cot in recognition of her services. The other cot will be called the Sir John Graves Simcoe cot.—Simcoe Reformer.

Barns Burned.

Simcoe, April 18.—Abram Neilson, a Charlotteville farmer, lost his build-stock and most of his instruments on Friday night by fire. Four horses 14 horned cattle and a few pigs were cremated. The family were sleeping soundly when aroused by neighbors who came to render help. The loss was \$2,500, with insurance \$1,000. The cause of the fire is a mystery.
