Lived to 102 Years

Garrett Furlong, for 68 Years Resident in Norwich, is Dead

Woodstock, Aug. 3.—The death took place this morning of one of the county's oldest residents, Garrett Furlong, who had reached the age of 102 years. He died at his home in Norwich, in which district he had lived for about 68 years. He was born on Christmas day, 1813, in the county of Wexford, Ireland. His wife died about 24 years ago. Until a very short time before his death, Mr. Furlong enjoyed comparatively good health. Five children survive—Moses and May at home; Mrs. J. A. McNamara, of St. Thomas and James and Michael of Norwich.

Mr. Garrett Furlong was a brother of the late Mr. Wm. Furlong, of the village of Nanticoke. He was an uncle of Mrs. Jos. Owen Jarvis.

A Grand Stock Horse

One of the grandest young stallions to leave this section in many years was shipped to the Canadian Northwest last week in the car loaded by Mr. Gus Weil. The stallion is for Mr. Frank Ross, of Pontiac, Sask.

Clyde King George, 16068, is a beautiful black, off fore hoof, face and both hind legs white, and was foaled July 8th, 1912, bred by that celebrated horseman, Mr. N. C. Montague. The horse was afterward owned by Messrs. Stephen and Charles Montague, who sold him to his present owner for service in the West.

Clyde King George, 16068, was sired by Winesome King imp. 11470, 15509, dam, Lady Cowan, imp. 24895, 25261, and is certainly a beauty in every particular. He now weighs over 1300 lbs. and, when fully developed, expert horsemen tell us he will weigh 1800 lbs. He is registered in the C.C. & H. as per number given above and has been controlled under the Ontario Stallion Act, inspected and passed by the Government veterinarians. He will make a grand stock horse and should make Haldimand famous in the West, and bring credit to Mr. Montague, his breeder. Mr. Ross is to be congratulated on securing such a fine specimen, and the farmers of Pontiac and district will profit much by Clyde King George being in their section for service.

Making Survey.

Ten Hydro Engineers Staking Out the Hamilton-Erie Line

The hard work put in by ex-Roeve, Dan Gallagher in Barton township and the vicinity together with the assistance of other supporters of the Hydro scheme, is bearing fruit, says the Hamilton Spectator. Controller Morris, who is associated with the Hydro department, stated this morning that he had received a report from Toronto explaining that ten engineers are now surveying for a Hydro route from Hamilton to Lake Erie. There is keen rivalry between Port Dover and Seikirk for a place on the line. The engineers are expected to report back to the Toronto commission as soon as they have decided on the feasibility of the scheme. At Port Dover a mass meeting is to be held this Thursday.
