Dear Sir—In answer to your letter of July 28, I wish to say, for the benefit of the Western Fair Association, that the stables are being put in a clean and sanitary condition. We have two men who do no thing else but lime-wash and disinfect and every particle of litter that might cause any infection is immediately burned, thus removing any possibility of infection. We are also about to start to replace the stalls in No. 5 stable and hope to have it in a satisfactory condition thus the stables should be even in better condition than they were last year.

News Jottings in Brief.

Samuel Stocker of Belleville, was drowned in the Bay of Quinte.

A German plan to attack the St. Lawrence Canal was thwarted by the French.

Italian reservists on their way home made demonstrations against interned German ships in Boston harbor.

W. H. Berry, a rural mail carrier, was killed and his daughter Edith seriously injured by a special car on the London and Port Stanley Railway striking his buggy.

John W. Harper, of New York, last survivor of the Harper Brothers magazine publishers, died on Saturday at Biddeford Pool, Maine. He was 84 years of age.

Colonial Secretary Bonar Law wired Governor Davidson, of Newfoundland, Sunday, that the 1st Battalion, Newfoundland regiment, was ordered to Egypt.

The death occurred Sunday afternoon of Richard Mooney, of Maidstone, one of the best known and wealthiest farmers of Essex. He was 71 years old.

Miss Charlotte Wegg, B. A., of St. Thomas, a graduate of the University of Toronto, and former teacher in Alma College, died as a result of injuries received in a motor accident six years ago.

The death of Edward Hett, inventor of the multicolor printing press, has been announced at his home in Staten Island. He was in Chicago 49 years ago, but went to New York when in his teens.

The Straits Settlements is the first of the British empire to ordain compulsory military service. By a bill passed by the Legislature at Singapore on Saturday all men between the ages of 18 and 55 are ordered for training.

A device invented by the Italian engineer Quarini, which makes it possible to drive torpedoes out of their course and explode them, has satisfied tests, says a special despatch from Rome, and arrangements are being made to supply the device to the allied fleets.

P. E. Verity, of the Verity Plow Company, Brantford, who has been spending the past few months in connection with the manufacture of shells at the Massey-Harris Company in Toronto, has been removed to the Company's branch at Batavia, New York, where he is undertaking extensive reorganization work.
