Legal Queries.

The Statute of Frauds.

This Statute was passed in England in 1678 and is still in force in Canada except in the province of Quebec. It was passed to prevent the commission of frauds in regard to the enforcing of old claims and various kinds of promises to answer for the debts of others. In order to effect this object its provisions require that certain contracts have to be in writing in order to be binding. Thus the following contracts must be evidenced in writing in order to be enforceable.

1. Contracts for the sale of lands or for any interest in lands, except lease for three years and under.
 2. Leases of lands for more than three years (such leases must also be under seal).
 3. Every special promise to answer for the debt, default or miscarriage of another.
 4. Every agreement, promise or undertaking made upon consideration of marriage except mutual promises to marry.
 5. Every agreement that by its terms is not to be performed within one year.
6. Contracts for the sale of any goods, wares or merchandise, for the price of \$40.00 or upwards, unless part or all of the goods have been delivered or part of the purchase price paid. This holds good notwithstanding that the goods may be intended to be delivered at some future time or may not at the time of the contract be actually made, procured or provided, or fit or ready for delivery or although some act may be requisite for the making or completing thereof or rendering the same fit for delivery.
