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



Bay, and to the fact that 80 per cent. of the world's output of nickel was om that region. Then there w Cobalt, which since 1905 has produced 200,000,000 cunces of silver, and paid out in dividends fully \$80,000,000. The Cobalt district, the speaker said. was now looked upon as a low-grade camy of silver, and was much more likely under these circumstances to be continous in the production of that

Coming to the Porcupine country Sir James ventured the prophecy that the history of Cobalt would repeat itself as to the rich income of gold in Porcupine, which ere long would be to Ontario, in fact to Canada, what Johannesburg was to South Africa, so far as the production of gold was concerned. "These three mining centres in' Ontario cannot fail to be a great source of encouragement to our people owing to the autcome of vast wealth, which will contribute, to the advacement of the prosperity of Canadn as a whole.". Sir James made a graceful reference to Canada's prosnects for doing business on a large scale with Russia after the war. The great ice-breakers of Russia," he said. are doing a grand work at Vladvivostok at the present time, clearing ing an ice channel for the commerical outlook of the Empire of Russia with the Empire of Canada as soon as the war is ended.

Canada was also to be congratulated. Sir James thought, on the great decrease in tuberculosis. When the Canadian Association for the "Prevention of Tubercuiosis, of which he has all along been an active member, was started fifteen years ago, the death rate from the disease was about 8,000. while to-day his recent investigation. extending from Victoria to Halifax showed that it had been reduced to 25 per cent. of that figure. In this connection he paid a tribute to the late Sir James Whitney, who had forwarded the best interests of medical education to the advntage of our graduates who are now performing the duties and responsibilities of tro esrional life in the hospitals and buttlefields, in a manner reflecting great credit on themseives and the medical schools in which they were educated. "Whitney" the speaker added, was a truly great man, and I feel confident his mantle has fallen most gracefully on the shoulders of Premier Hearst and his Cabinet, who will so discharge the duties and responsibilities of office as to advance the best interests of Ontario, the premier, province of Can-

The speaker considered there were many things which should encourage the people in the development of the trade and commerce of Canada, which was considered to-day the brightest jewel in the colonial coronet of the Empire. "The outlook of Canada never was brighter than at the present time." The war loan was undoubted evidence of t e prosperity surrounding us. doubly subscribed, and our Gor rnment not only tested our pockets but the hearts of our people, as well as developing a degree of confidence in the custodians of the rights and privileges of our people."
