### ENLIST NOW!

Your King and Country need you.—Now!

"Out of the millions of men who are now fighting on the several battle-fields of Europe, only the British soldiers are there of their own volition. They are a volunteer army. Several times within the last year the British Government has been on the point of changing the system. But whenever it was about to fall something always happened to give it a boost.—The refugees from Belgium, raids on undefended towns by German cruisers, and the Lusitania affair, etc. Why wait for another disaster? There can be no peace for the Empire until life is assured, and life can have no assurance until Germany's dream of world power has been destroyed. Enlist!

No one should stay at home on account of his position or his profession. Nine-tenths of those in the trenches have left good jobs. If a man is physically fit, and between 18 and 45 years of age, there is only one thing for him to do—enlist.

The events of the past week are eye-opening. South Africa the latest dominion in the Empire, has sent 5.5 per cent of her male population, while Canada, the oldest and most settled, has sent only 2.3 per cent.—Australia is increasing her overseas force to 300,000 men. Canada must jump again to beat those records.

Do you feel happy as you walk along the streets and see other men wearing the King's uniform. At least, you are two years behind the fashions if you are not in khaki.

What would happen to Canada if every man stayed at home? You: King and Kitchener and 100,000 more Canadians at the front are calling you.

When wrong is being done or free men are being enslaved, it is the duty of the strong and honourable man to step in and prevent it, if he can, and if he cannot, to fight. Any other course only leads to the triumph of evil. Our only duty as Canadians is to spare no effort, to defeat the attempt of autocratic Germany to establish the reign of might in place of the reign of liberty throughout Europe and the world. Delay is dangerous. The future of the world is in the balance. Therefore, enlist now and maintain the cause of justice and freedom.

In what respect does the conduct of the German army differ from that of the highway robber, who murders or overpowers in vision and then takes or demands his ransom? A day of reckoning must come for Germany. Let us do our part to make it come quickly.

The mills of God grind slowly but they grind exceeding small. With patience He stands waiting With exultation grinds He all!

In 1900 the Kaiser addressed his army sent out on the China expedition, as follows,—

"When you meet the foe you will defeat them. No quarter will be given. No prisoners will be taken. Let all who fall into your hands be at your mercy." The Germans are to-day following out this precept. Enlist and crush such tyranny and despotism.—Com.

## Successful Banquet Closes the Year.

Walpole Township Council and Walpole Fire Insurance Co. Gather at Festive Board.

One of the most pleasing and highly successful events of the closing year was the annual banquet, held by the members of the Walpole Township Council and its municipal officers at the Commercial House, Jarvis, last Wednesday evening.

This year the festive time were presided by the officers and directed by the Walpole Fire Insurance Co. and the two organizations with a few invited guests had a jolly time that the even, thus will in future years be "re-occurive."

The popular and energetic Reeve of Maitimant's banner township, — Capt. W. D. Rouison, occupied the chair at the head of the table and acted as toast-master for the evening. At the further end of the table, the company was fortunate in having Mr. H. H. Staples, now working in Hamilton, representing the Government for the Canadian Maritime Fund and the Canada In Red Cross Fund.

After full justice had been done the good things provided by Hos. W. L. Am Wood and his able assistants, a somewhat lengthy toast-list was very ably presided over by Mr. Rouison, who opened the evening's programme by calling on the assembly to rise and sing "God Save the King."

This was followed by a very interesting and highly instructive address by Mr. Staples on "Germany and Prussian Militarism." Mr. Staples, who for over three months has been an unwilling resident of Dresden, Germany (being a student there) after his brilliant escape out between Great Britain and Germany spoke very interestingly of the war, particularly with reference to Germany and its people, and his position as it really existed at the time war was declared. His glowing remarks were given in support of the Patriotic and Red Cross Funds, dealing more particularly with the needs of these two organizations and Walpole's obligations toward same in proportion to what is being done by other townships in the County of Hamilton.

He also made brief reference to the Machine Gun Fund, which was so generously raised in Walpole, and which was explained fully in a letter published in The Record some two weeks ago.

On resuming his seat, Mr. Staples was heartily cheered for his able and interesting address.

"Public Utilities" was then proposed and was responded to by Mr. Sol. Winger, the company rising and singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Mr. Winger in a most spicy speech told a few good stories and dealt with the toast referring to bridges, natural gas, Hydro power, telephone, good roads, etc. He closed by wishing all present the best of good luck and prosperity.

"Mutual Fire Insurance Co." was responded to by Messrs. B. McDonald, J. Nelson Howard and George L. Miller. The first two mentioned spoke briefly, and left Mr. Miller to respond to the toast, who dealt with the subject of co-operation, giving some few "pointers" where the local Company had erred and advising immediate action at their next annual meeting for the restoration of adequate assessment to bring the Company to the position to which it is entitled, the banner farmers' mutual fire insurance company of the province.

"Municipal Institutions" was responded to by Messrs. Wm. Clark, Geo. Morrow, D. McBurney and Jas. Vaker. The deputy Reeve gave a brief historical talk on Walpole and the other Councilors dealt most emphatically on the subject of good roads and steel bridges. They all spoke of their deep interest in municipal affairs and closed by wishing all "A Merry Xmas."

Capt. Rouison, as Reeve of the Township spoke for a few minutes on the subject of good roads, giving emphasis to the work of maintenance being as important as the act of building same in the first place. He expressed himself as being a thorough advocate of steel bridges—in a word "Permanency" was his motto.

"Sister Municipalities" was then responded to by Reeve I. W. Holmes, of the village of Jarvis. The company sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" (double forte). Mr. Holmes gave a brief sketch of the village since its incorporation, five years ago. He complimented both Council and Fire Insurance Company on their progressive work and closed by expressing his hearty approval of the banquet idea as a fitting close to the business year as it was a good means for social intercourse between the governing bodies of municipalities, as regards township's best interest, as regards municipal government and fire protection.

"The Professions"—responded to by Dr. R. G. Howell, who stated that as he was not a municipal man he would not take up the time of the evening. He desired to express his best wishes to all and the season's greetings. "The Legislature" responded to by

Dr. Wm. Jacques, M.P.P., who stated that he was not present to make a speech, but he desired to "add his bit" on the matter of good roads. He referred to the general good health of the township and how easy it was to take had been of late years in dealing with contagious diseases, he being the medical health officer. "The people," said the Dr., "are quite contented and now help rather than hinder the work of the R. of H. The speaker then dealt with the War topic, of Germany's resources and her conservation of same, and her ideas of conservation of farming. He closed by expressing his appreciation of Mr. Staples' address and extended his compliments of a season to all.

J. J. Parsons Esq., ex-Reeve of the township was also coupled with the toast. He paid a high tribute to the ability of his successor in office, Capt. Rouison. He heartily concurred with the many remarks of previous speakers re good roads, bridges, etc. He made mention of the War's great struggle on the continent, Canada's part therein; the German Military rule; on raised governments paying a high tribute to the role of good Queen Victoria, the late King Edward, and the British Navy, the latter of which was a tower of strength for the protection of Great Britain and the world at large. He expressed hope for the speedy enlistment of the 14th Bat., now forming, and the ultimate success of the Allied "Township Officials" truly responded to by Clark Thompson and Collectors Henning, Weiler, Clark, Shack and Kelly.

The Press" was responded to by A. T. Mitchell, who extended the season's "Best Wishes" to all and promised a report of the evening's proceedings herewith published in The Record.

Mr. Parsons again asked the indulgence of the assembly to express his high opinion of all township officials and he felt that the representatives of the township would most heartily endorse all he might say—They were a body of men thoroughly versed in municipal work and fulfilled their duties with satisfaction to the municipality, an great credit to themselves. He then proposed a toast to the worthy Reeve, Capt. W. D. Rouison, whom he regarded as one of the best municipal officials in the County Council—a man thoroughly versed in municipal politics, and liked his office purely for the service he rendered his fellow-citizens. The company again broke out in song to Capt. Rouison, "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

Mr. Rouison responded by thanking his official staff for the past year's good condition of affairs as he had had found them on coming into office. "A Merry Christmas to All" was the Captain's best wish as he resumed his seat.

The evening, full of good stories, light speeches and the best of good fellowship was then brought to a close by the singing of "God Save the King."
