

### SOLAR ENERGY.

Its Constant Radiation is Lessen ing the Mass of Our Sun.

The work of Einstein on the princitle of relativity shows that a body which radiates energy loses a portion of its mass depending on the energy radiated. It follows that the sun, which continually radiates energy, is constantly losing mass. M. J. Bosier has calculated that the sun loses a mass equal to that of our earth in 30,000,000

If it be assumed that the mass thus lost is gravitational mass it follows. that the length of the year increases by six seconds in 1,000,000 years and that in the same time the mean longitude of the earth is affected in such a way as to produce a variation of onetenth of a year—that is, a retardation

of thirty-six days in the seasons. Such variations are to minute to be observable. In stellar systems possessing a higher temperature, the effect would be much more marked, for the energy radiated by a body varies as the fourth power of its absolute temperature.



### EGG PRICES

For the first time in a number of years eggs have taken a prominent place in Canada's export trade. This is largely due to the unprecedented demand for eggs on the part of the British market, and the fact that British dealers have shown a marked preference for Canadian eggs over United

States eggs, and a willingness to pay a distinctly nigher price for them. So great in fact has been the demand that Canadian dealers have shipped practically all of the available Canadian storage product to the Old Country. As a result there is not in Canada at the present time, sufficient eggs in storage to supply home consumption until fresh receipts in ap-

preciable quantities begin to come in. Quentities of eggs from the United States, however, are being imported into Canada, some in bond for export, but the larger part to take the place of the Canadian product exported. On account of the keen demand for Canadian eggs above mentioned, United States eggs can be laid down in Canada at the present time, duty paid, at several cents per dozen less than the price at which Canadian eggs are selling for, for export and they should be procurable by the consumers accordingly.

ing rust from iron. Kerosene used to moisten stove polish makes stoves look like new. Wash zinc with hot, soapy water and polish with cloth dipped in kero-

Irons wiped on a cloth dampened with kerosene will not scorch clothes To prevent white garments from looking yellow, put a little kerosene in the wash water.

Linoleum and oilcloth are brightened and improved by rubbing with flannel dipped in kerosene. Before storing away stovepipe for summer, rub it all over with kerosene and stuff ends with paper to keep

out moisture. To clean the sewing machine, moisten all bearings with kerosene and run rapidly for a rew minutes; then care fully wipe off the liquid with a soft

### PALMS AND FERNS.

Something About Their Care is the House in Winter.

Paims and ferns are becoming men and more popular for interfor decorations where there is no direct sunlight. While regular watering with them is essential, great care should be taken not to overwater. With most palms it is better to keep them a lintle dry than too wet.

This is particularly true when the pot holding the palm is placed in a

While the plants are small, wash the foliage occasionally with a suds made from a good mild soap and water that has the chill taken off, and immediately follow this with a thorough rinsing of clear water of the same temperature. When the plant grows large, spray the tops frequently with clear

Browning at the tips shows trouble at the roots of the plant. It may be caused by (first) overwatering; (second) worms on the roots; (third) lack of proper plant food. Nearly always the trouble may be traced to the first cause. When it arises from the second it is not the ordinary earth worm that is to blame, but a little, white, harmless-looking pest that emerges into the air as a small flying insect. To destroy this, dissolve a piece of lime as big as a man's fist in three gallons of water, and after it is through activity and the milky mixture has become clear, pour off the clear water and soak the soil containing the plant with it. The soaking should be thorough.

Plant food is provided by stirring small quantities of bone meal and wood ashes into the surface of the soil. a teaspoonful of ammonia to a quart of water) in place of ordinary watering. The brown tips should be trimmed off. Scale causes the leaves to turn yellow, and when they are not so turned by overwatering, look for scale. Wash it off, or spray with kerosene emulsion, a nicotine prepara tion or whalcoil scap.

Ferns should be placed in a strong light, not sunlight. Water them sparingly, yet keep them moist. See to it they have good drainage. If the mealy bug-a white, wooly insect-attacks them, examine the plants daily and remove them. Other posts, the red spider and the aphis or green fly, are eradicated by washing. They should be given food waterings, like the
