## PATRIOTIC CONCERT Presentation and Address of Appreciation

### JARVIS CHORAL SOCIETY

The second annual Choral Concert of the Jarvis Choral Society was held in Chambers' Hall, Jarvis, on Tuesday evening, February 9th, when some forty voices under the direction of Mr. Ernest Heatley, the celebrated baritone of Hamilton, played the leading part in the lengthy and interesting program. Mrs. Clara Salisbury-Baker, Reader, of Hamilton, and the Jarvis Orchestra assisted.

Mr. Ivan W. Holmes, Reeve of Jarvis, acted in the capacity of Chairman and fulfilled his part with his customary dignity and pleasing and affable manner. Miss Frances Newell acted as accompanist and completed her duties with her usual pleasing style and accomplished manner.

Although the proceeds were advertised for patriotic purposes, there was a distinct disappointment in the attendance, and the proceeds fell some little short of the expenses. This was the most, and in fact the only regrettable feature of the entire evening's performance. The Choral had hoped for a tidy surplus for patriotic purposes, but this anticipation could not be realized with the small attendance present.

The program rendered was an excellent one in every respect, the choruses being particularly fine, and the solo work of local artists very pleasing indeed. Misses Allen, Snyder and Thompson sang in various numbers and their local admirers were justly proud of their rendition of difficult selections in the numbers given. Mr. Heatley deserves the highest praise for his work in bringing the chorus and soloists to their efficiency as produced at this entertainment.

In the selections rendered by Mr. Heatley, the audience were highly pleased, and his solo work brought forth much favorable comment and hearty applause.

Mrs. Baker who appeared before a Jarvis audience for the second time this season, was listened to with much pleasure, varied and instructive and received with considerable applause. Encores were frequent, to which Mrs. Baker freely responded.

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### Judge Douglas' Death Occurs at Dunnville

#### County Judge of Haldimand and Local Judge of High Court Since 1904.

Dunnville, Feb. 4.—George B. Douglas, county judge of Haldimand, passed away here early this morning in his fifty-ninth year, after being in failing health for about a year. He was born in Warkworth, Northumberland county, in 1856. After being graduated in the Arts course at the University of Toronto in 1879, he attended the Law School, and was called to the Bar in 1882. He practised in Chatham for 22 years and was then appointed County Judge of Haldimand County. His occupancy of that office for the past eleven years had been remarkable for the few successful appeals from his judgment.

About twenty-five years ago he married Miss Annie Foxley, of Liverpool, England, then a resident of Chatham, who survives, with four children.—Marguerite and Beatrice at home, and Jack and Annie attending the University of Toronto; also four sisters and two brothers.—Miss Douglas and Miss Adelaide Douglas at the old home in Warkworth; Mrs. J. P. Taylor, Princeton, Ill.; Mrs. M. D. Carlaw, Toronto; Mr. D. H. Douglas, Chatham; and Mr. W. A. Douglas, of Colborne, Ont.

Judge Douglas was a man of scholarly attainments. His only lodge affiliation was with the Knights of Pythias of Chatham; His one hobby was lawn bowling, and he was one of the valued members of the Dunnville Club.
