field marshal's outfit, the royal suite in scarlet and gold, the tong-legged aides and their aiguillettes, the statesmen in their fulgurant Windsor uniforms, the robin-red supreme court judges as snug as cherries in a cocktail, the knights glowing like sunflowers and the honorary colonels flaunting like poppies, th eladies in their best bib and tucker-society, in short, dressed up like a circus horse and waiting to ake part in the grand opening parade in the main tent. Three years ago I used to laugh at

that stuff. I even made jokes about the add blending of religious solemnity and social flutter.—the Old Hundred and the new Four Hundred, the Doxology doing the two-step so-tospeak. Now, as Mr. Pepys would say, I find the ritual vastly comforting. It goes to prove that the British Empire is still on the job and that our faith in it can rally round these old forms and ceremonies which remind Canada that she is part of the Big Show. And jolly well glad Canada ought to be that she is with the Big Show, for the Monroe Doctrine, as interpreted by ex-President Taft and Count Von Bernsdorf, is of mighty little use to us nowadays. On the whole, the British Navy does better work. At any rate, the Monroe Doctrine is not being much worn in Ottawa this session.

Which brings me back to the Finance Minister's war resolutions. Fifty million dollars last session, one hundred million dollars. One hundred and fifty million dollars added to the National debt. It's a big mouthful but I take it at a gulp. British connection has done several hundred of millions of dollars more for Canada than Canada ever did for British connection. 
