Blind Hymn Writer

Millions of church goers in America and other christian lands will mourn the death of Fanny Jane Crosby, the writer of scores of popular evangelistic and Sunday school hymns. It is now more than 50 years ago that her intense a vivid spiritual voice first came into vogue, and many of them were set to music by Ira D. Sankey, whose compositions became scarcely less popular than the verses for which they were written.

Fanny Jane Crosby's title to fame rests not simply upon the fact that she wrote so many religious lyrics but that she did her work while suffering from total blindness. In early childhood she lost the sight of her eyes yet for three quarters of a century she was an assiduous student and writer, producing a total of 8000 hymns. Some of her work will probably last such as "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," "Pass Me Not," "Rescue the Perishing," "An "O to the Work," Already these and others have been translated into all the principal languages of the world.

Delhi, Feb. 10.—The death took place on Saturday morning of Richard Lynnes, in his 62nd year. Deceased had been ill only about three days, and appearing to be progressing favorably, when he took a sudden relapse and died within a few hours.

The late Mr. Lynnes is survived by nine children, five daughters and four sons, all at home, besides his widow.

The funeral took place from his late home here on Monday, and services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Hurlbert and by Prosperity Lodge, No. No. 325, I.O.O.F., of which organization he was a past grand master.

Longest Pastorale

Rev. H. G. Livingstone's twelve years as pastor of Barton St. Methodist church, Hamilton, has been a fruitful one, and the official Board took great pleasure in inviting him to remain in charge. He has the honor of having served the longest pastorale of any Methodist clergyman in Canada. Nineteen hundred people had been admitted to membership during his time.

Don't!

Don't tell your child the happiest days he will ever know are his days of childhood. Don't say with maturity comes care, and work, and troubles, and fears that make life a burden. If your child comes to you with a trial that is great to him, but to you in the light of your years and experience, is the merest trifle, don't say, "you are very foolish to be troubled by so small a thing," but remember he has but little reason to use and no experience to guide him, and that for the time his grief "clothes him as a garment," and it is for you, with your love and sympathy to render it and bring him sunlight again. It is a great wrong to believe the mild fears, grotesque fancies, and unmeaning doubts which haunt the minds of children, are passing whims. So vivacious these they often come to use in middle life or old age and cause an involuntary shudder. If a child's troubles were usually small the understanding is smaller. The pitiful frailty with which they attempt to settle weighty questions which their elders often give up as hopeless, demands our most delicate sympathy. Every stage of life has its peculiar trials, and just as surely its own joys. Let us not then so recklessly risk our reputation for wisdom as to point to children and say "Now my dear child, is your holiday. Enjoy it to the full, for the years that are passing on you are full to the brim of care and trial. Say rather, "if the future has so great responsibilities, so has it proportion reward." The surest, greatest happiness of life should come with development of mind and heart.

Right to Harvest Ice will be Determined

A supreme court writ of more than ordinary importance has been issued by H. D. Petrie, in which the court will be asked to determine the right harvest ice from Silver Lake, Port Dover, when a company has the right to harvest ice and also the fishing rights to the lake. Mr. Petrie is acting for C.H.A. Lees, heir to the Thompson estate, of which L.G. Morgan is the trustee, and who is the defendant in the action. The estate, which is valued at \$40,000, has been disposed of with the exception of the right of ownership of the lake in question. The plaintiff some time ago gave fishing rights to the Penman company, but the conveyance of the land on which the lake is situated to Mr. Lees has been delayed. He now asks the court for the title of the lake, which includes the piscatorial and ice rights of the lake. As far as Mr. Petrie has been able to learn, this will be the first case to be decided in Canada on the right to harvest ice. Some importance is attached to the decision. An Port Dover's ice supply comes from Silver Lake and is dependent upon it. The plaintiff contends that he is entitled to the conveyance of the lake.

Opening of Canon Hicks Memorial Hall

The Canon Hicks Memorial Hall was formally open to the public on Monday evening, February, 1915, by a supper and program. The new hall, which is to serve as a Sunday School and Parish Hall, was started by the late Canon Hicks, a short time before his death. Following the demise of their beloved Rector, the vestry decided to complete the work as a memorial to one who spent so many years for the good of his parish. The hall is a handsome red brick structure with Ohio Sandstone trimmings, on a cement basement foundation, and measures 30x60 feet. It is joined to the church vestry and it is in the connection section that the main entrance is placed. From this entrance the auditorium is reached through a main lobby, where is located stairways leading to the basement and the gallery. The main building and gallery will seat about 500 people comfortably. Mr. D. D. Gunton, contractor, has accomplished his work in a very efficient and prompt manner.—British Canadian.

German American Traitors

When a person born in one country emigrates into another country and takes the oath of allegiance to the country of his adoption, he becomes a citizen of that country and his duty to the new country is the same as any citizen born therein; therefore, if he engages in any enterprise contrary to the interests of his adopted country in favor even of the country of his birth, he is a traitor and liable to be punished as such—even with death. Even if he has not become a citizen, whilst he remains in the country of his adoption, he is subject to its laws as are other inhabitants. Therefore all who have bandied themselves together to break the United States' neutrality laws are traitors and punishable as such. German morality, however, seems to be different from that of all other people and the oath of allegiance they swore to and signed in the United States are only scraps of paper.


