Several of the leading linen manufacturers of Belgium will visit Canada this winter and attempt to arrange the establishment of flax fibre plants throughout the Dominion. Belgium produced the highest grade Linen in the world and the war has absolutely paralyzed the industry. Mr. Chas. Jennings, of Tilsonburg received word on Friday from the War Office, that his brother, William Henry Jennings, had been killed in action in France, on Nov. 11th, at some place unnamed. He had been in service in India eight years and had been home a year. When war was declared he was called to the colors and joined his regiment and was sent to the front. Another brother, Harry Jennings, left Tilsonburg Sept. 1, for England. He had seen service before and is now at the front with the British army.

Eight Votes Over Three-fifths 86 For; 44 Against.

After a quiet but nevertheless exciting contest, Local Option was carried in Jarvis on Monday by the following vote,—

For the By-Law, 86 Against the By-Law, 44

Caledonia defeated it by 23 votes under the three-fifths requirement.

Hagersville defeated Local Option by the close figures of three under the three-fifths requirement.

Simcoe defeated the By-Law by an even vote majority.

## Death of Mrs. Waddel.

In the death of Amy Colman, beloved wife of Mr. James Waddel, of Woodhouse, and the eldest daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Colman, of Jarvis, a very wide circle of friends in this community mourn the loss of one who was much endeared to all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Deceased was in her 41st year.

Mrs. Waddel had been ailing for about two years and recently spent two months in the Hamilton Hospital to undergo an operation, when it was found that she was suffering from that dread disease, consumption of the bowels.

All that medical skill and careful nursing could do availed little, and her death, though young and in the prime of life, came somewhat suddenly on Wednesday, December 30, 1914, she remains being quietly laid to rest on January 2nd, 1915, at St. John's cemetery, near Simcoe.

Mrs. Waddel was of a bright, sunny disposition and much beloved by a very wide circle of friends, who regret deeply her sad demise so young in life. She leaves to mourn her loss, a loving and faithful husband, two bright little daughters, her parents, one brother and one sister.

The bereaved ones have the deepest sympathy of a very wide circle of friends and The Record joins in its extensive efforts with much sympathy.

## Death of Maj. Faulds.

A long and eventful career was brought to a close on Wednesday by the death of Major William Faulds, who passed away at the residence of his son, William S., in Toronto. Major Faulds' father served as a drummer in the battle of Waterloo, and also with the famous Black Watch at Gibraltar, where the late Major was born in 1827, thus making him 87 years old. When he was ten years of age the family moved to London, Ont., and afterwards to Aylmer, where Major Faulds resided most of his life. He served in the American Army during the Mexican war in 1847, and had been a pensioner to the present. In the organization of the 25th Battalion of Elgin County in the sixties he was one of the foremost in the movement, and was a prominent officer until his retirement in 1899, when he held the position of senior major. He received a medal for long service. He also organized the Aylmer Band of the 25th Battalion, and was bandmaster for many years. Music composed by him is now played by many of the leading Canadian bands.—Tilsonburg Observer.

## IN MEMORIAM

After an illness of nearly a month the death occurred on Sunday, Dec. 27th, 1914, of Miss Jane Saunders, the eldest daughter of the late Thomas Saunders.

She was born on Oct. 6th, 1864, and in early life became a member of the Nanticoke Methodist Church, where she retained her membership until her death. She had been living at Port Dover but returned to the old homestead when she became ill. The funeral took place at Nanticoke on Tuesday Dec. 29. The service was in charge of Rev. Mr. Shields, who preached from the text, "There is but a step between me and death."

Her loss will be felt, not only by the family, but by a wide circle of friends.

## THE NEWSPAPER LAW.

The law regarding newspapers has been amended so that it protects the publishers more than formerly. Any one taking a newspaper from the post office, whether they have ordered it or not, becomes liable for payment for same, unless it is marked "Specimen Copy." Another amendment is that no subscriber to a newspaper can stop same or refuse it at the postoffice until they have paid up all that is in arrears.
