### THE NEWSPAPER LAW.

The law regarding newspapers has been amended so that it protects the publishers more than formerly. Any one taking a newspaper from the post office, whether they have ordered it or not, becomes liable for payment for same, unless it is marked "Specimen Copy." Another amendment is that a subscriber to a newspaper can stop same or reduce it at the postoffice until they have paid up all that is in arrears.
