Seven Smallpox Cases At Hagersville.

Indian Reserve. Nearby. Reports Some Sixty Cases.

(From our Own Correspondent.)

Hagersville is unfortunate enough to have more than a small-pox scare. It has 125 smallpox within its borders in four corners and the town officials are much worried over its visit to our midst. There are at present some seven cases in the village, and all houses affected are under quarantine. The public school has closed its doors indefinitely, and the High School will evidently have to follow suit, if the dread disease is not checked and that in the very immediate future.

The Indian Reserve near by has 60 or more cases, and this greatly adds to the difficulties of the authorities in stamping out the plague. While it is freely admitted that the authorities have a big task on their hands, they are working heroically for its suppression, but the immense spread of the disease throughout the Indians nearby lends every obstacle for its check, and at present little can be predicted as to when the difficulty will be overcome. The mingling of our Indian neighbors about town has given the dread disease every possible chance to spread freely before the authorities were aware of its presence and took the proper precaution to prevent its further spread among the Indians and whites alike.

The authorities soon hope to be able to report a clean sheet, as the merchants and others already begin to feel the falling off in trade as a consequence of the presence of smallpox. One death has been reported from the Reserve and there are several serious cases, but the disease in town is said to be of a mild type. York is reported to have three cases. Rev. Mr. Brett, Mr. Robert Young and one other. Cayuga also has a mild case, and some light cases are reported.
