10 PATRIOTIC FUNDS

Welland, Jan. 21.—Welland's two-days campaign to raise \$16,000 for the Canadian Patriotic Fund closed to-night with a total of \$24,373. Besides the collections, the local association has been given three town lots and some live stock the proceeds of the sale of which will bring Welland's contribution over \$25,000. The campaign was organized by W. C. Ryan, of Woodstock, and the canvassers were so well pleased with his work that to-night they presented him with a resolution of thanks and a purse of gold of their own contribution. It is expected that Welland county will raise \$50,000 for the fund.

DEATH OF EMERSON LOCKARD.

Mr. Emerson Lockard died at his home in Watford on Friday Jan. 15, of aneurism. He had not enjoyed good health for nearly three years, but still worked at his trade as a mason until a few weeks ago. Mr. Lockard had many friends in that place, having lived there nearly all his life. At one time served on the Village Council.

Emerson Lockard was born in the township of Townsend, near Boston, in 1854. His father was Peter Lockard. He leaves to mourn their loss a widow and three children, Fred, of Simcoe, Mrs. J. W. Smith, of St. Thomas and Elma, at home. Also two brothers and two sisters, David, of Fairport, N.Y., Albert of London, Mrs. R. Lightheart, of Brampton, and Mrs. Thomas Hardy, of Townsend.

The funeral was held from his late home on Sunday afternoon last and was largely attended. The service was conducted by Revs. Truax and Fitch.

Home Circle Loses Suit

SOCIETY MUST PAY.

Judgment in the appeal of the Canadian Home Circles in the case of Grainger was handed out at Creso Hall, Friday. The Appeal Court upholds the previous judgment given in favor of Grainger. Grainger was suing to compel the Canadian Home Circles to pay him \$100 a year due him under the life expectancy clause of the policy he holds in the Society. It appears that last March new rules were passed with regard to this clause in which the age limit was raised. Under the new rules Grainger could not benefit as he was entitled to, and not only would he have had to continue paying large assessments but could not realize under the expectancy clause until he reached the age of 82. The society claimed that under the new rules they were not bound to pay him. The trial Judge however, ruled that the Society pay him \$100 due last May and also pay \$100 each year for four years to come. This decision was ratified.—Waterford Star.


