### Barn Destroyed by Fire

The barn of Mr. Edward Herod, 4th line, Onoda, was destroyed by fire on Saturday evening last, the supposed cause being the over-heating of new hay. A wagon load of hay standing on the barn floor and several loads in the barn, all his harness, a batch of half grown pigs and all his farm utensils were destroyed. A nephew, Mr. Elmer Herod, was the only person at the fire for some time, as nearly all the neighbors were at Caledonia and other places. Mr. Herod and his son Fred, were in Caledonia at the time. He was insured in the Onoda Farmers' Mutual for \$1700. The barn was a modern one erected about four or five years ago. The loss will be quite heavy. A number of horses and cattle in the barn were rescued by Mr. Elmer Herod.

### Seized While Bowling J. R. Davis Dies Quickly

Port Dover, July 19.—Yesterday, at 4.30 p.m., while bowling with friends, John R. Davis, in his twenty-fifth year as Customs Officer here, was seized with a paralytic stroke. The services of Dr. A. H. Cook were secured quickly, and all possible was done, but he died at 7 o'clock. Mr. Davis was an ex-President of the local Bowling Club and President of the Board of Trade. He leaves a wife, three daughters, Mrs. F. L. Grice, Hamilton; Mrs. Albert Hopkins, St. Louis, and Miss Sadie, at home, and one son, William, on the Canadian Government Service Steamer Vigian. He was a Conservative and an Ancient member of Port Dover Lodge, A.O.U.W., Past Grand of Norfolk Lodge, I.O.O.F., and Past Master of Erie Lodge, No. 149, A. E. & A. M., which last will conduct a Masonic funeral on Monday or Tuesday, being contingent on when Mrs. Hopkins can reach here. He was also President of the local branch of Upper Canada Bible Society.

He was born in England and was in his 64th year. He was a public minded citizen, taking energetic part in matters pertaining to the welfare of the town. Himself a lover of many sports, he had been quietly corresponding for some time back to secure the hidden property on First ave. for a public playground realizing that for the growth of the village was rapidly increasing the number of suitable sites for this purpose.

Mrs. Jane Jose who resided in Toronto before the railways came, died in her 92nd year.

Wilfrid Thornton, a C.T.R. engineer, of Lindsay, was drowned in the Serpog river owing to a camp being capsized by a passing steamer.
