The Western Fair

London, Canada.

SEPTEMBER 10th TO 18th.

The Western Fair of London, Ontario, as an agricultural exhibition occupies a prominent position in Western Ontario, and throughout the entire Dominion. This will be the 18th annual exhibition without a break, and every dollar of prize money won during that time has been paid. The management has been increasing the prize list from year to year and this year through the assistance of the Dominion Government they are enabled to add over \$3000 to what was already a liberal list. Live stock men should avail themselves of the privilege of exhibiting this year in larger numbers than ever. Exhibitors always report good results from showing at London, as buyers are plentiful. The Dairy and Poultry Departments will be of special interest this year. If a prize list, entry form or any other information is required about the exhibition write the Secretary, A. M. Hunt, London, Ontario. The dates are September 10th to the 18th.

The Hydro-Electric by-law was carried in Harrison yesterday by a majority of 220.

The Aberdeen Trawler Gadwell has been sunk by a German submarine. Her crew landing at Stromness.

A frame dwelling owned by John A. Herbison, at Junction, caught fire on Sunday and was totally destroyed entailing a loss of \$3000. A spark from the chimney was the cause.

Joseph Rohach an Austrian, arrested two weeks ago on a charge of assisting the enemy, was Monday morning sentenced to six months in the county jail at Brantford. Rohach was found guilty of sending 400 kronen, \$80 to the Austro-Hungary war fund.

Willie S. Esson, of Moneymore, a lad of 12 years of age, met with a serious accident on Sunday. He was climbing toward the peak of a barn when he fell, breaking both wrists, and dislocating his right elbow. He was taken to the Belleville Hospital for treatment.

The crew of the Norwegian sailing ship Brighton, which arrived at New York, yesterday from Jamaica, feasted on fried bananas after their ship was struck by lightning in the Gulf Stream on July 21. The lightning bolt shattered the foretopmast and roasted the bananas near the base of the mast.

Mystery surrounds the disappearance of Ede. Leonard Bellamy, of Niagara Falls, a member of the 4th Regiment, who was on guard duty at Welland. He has been missing since Sunday night. His wife has no clue to her husband's whereabouts, but believes he met with foul play. His rifle was found on the canal bank.

The body of Percy Armour, who was drowned in the Montreal river near Elk Lake on Thursday night, was recovered Sunday night. The deceased who was a Collingwood boy, worked at the Paragon Mine. He was upset from a canoe. The body will be taken to Collingwood for burial.

Damage estimated at fifteen per cent has been caused to the oat crop in Ontario by the prevalence of smut, according to information received by the Department of Agriculture. Smut has also caused some damage to wheat barley and corn, but not to a serious extent.
