Sandusk W. I.

On Monday, May 31, the summer meeting of the W. I. was held at the home of Mrs. Peacock, and was well attended, 21 being present.

After the President had formally opened the meeting, she presented Dr. Sylvia Blanchard, of Welland, who gave an interesting address on the subject of "Personal Hygiene." She emphasized the necessity for physical culture and demonstrated the proper method, especially for keeping the chest clear of tubercular tendencies. She stated that what constituted a good figure was not a slim waist but an erect figure and a good carriage. In the care of the teeth the gums are an important part and should be brushed freely so as to keep them strong and healthy. The four eliminating organs are the most important in the prevention of disease and the healthier one is kept the less work the others will have to do. Thus by caring for the skin by bathing, brushing, massaging and giving free access to air and sunlight, we are sparing the more delicate organs—the kidneys. Sleep is not to be neglected, especially in children, who (and) they are eight years of age should be put to bed at six o'clock. It is the loss of sleep while young which causes so many of our nervous wrecks.

Dr. Blanchard also touched on the subject of "Household Hygiene" under two headings—1. Perfect Cleanliness with plain furnishings and loose carpets, and 2. A Mixed Diet with plenty of variety from day to day milk, vegetables and eggs to be used freely and meat in moderation except for those doing heavy manual labor.

The prevention of disease by a thorough knowledge of the laws of health is now considered to be more important than curing diseases. In China, the doctors are paid to keep the people healthy, and if one is sick they are expected to doctor without a fee as they have not properly done their part before.

A vote of appreciation and thanks was moved by Mrs. Pond and seconded by Mrs. Peacock, to Dr. Blanchard for her excellent lecture. The business then was taken up. It was found out that the motor ambulance for the county had been dropped. Mrs. Calvin Bush gave the report of the program committee.

Want Hydro Radial Along Lake Erie

Selkirk, May 27, 1915

A meeting of the Committee of the Local Section of the Hydro Radial Association of the Township of Walpole, was held in the office of J. W. Holmes Esq., The following were present

We, the Committee of the Township of Walpole, organized under the auspices of the Niagara District of the Hydro Radial Union, highly approve of the Radial Railway System and being deprived of railway facilities in the southern part of this Township bordering on Lake Erie. We take much pleasure in submitting the following resolutions—

Moved by Jas. Vokes, seconded by D. McDonald and resolved that the Hydro Radial Commission be requested to send a Surveyor to estimate the probable cost of construction, the earnings and the location of a Hydro Electric Railway through the southern part of the Township of Walpole.

Carried.

Moved by F. A. Pratten, seconded by Geo. Pond, and resolved, that it is the opinion of the Walpole Local Committee, that the location of a line running east and west would be one that not only supply to our people in the southern part of the township a long felt want of better transportation but be one of financial success, and would be extended both east and west so that in the course of time it would span the southern peninsula of Ontario from Niagara on the East to the Detroit river to the west, with such cross lines as may be deemed advisable.

Carried.

The Secretary was requested to forward a copy of these resolutions to the representative of this county, requesting him to interview the Railway Commission and have the surveying done and locating as soon as possible.
