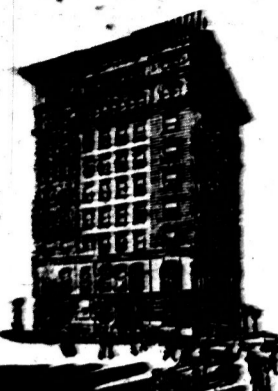

Quiet Funerals In the Darkness

ARE WORSE ON THE NERVES THAN HOLDING A FRONT LINE OF TRENCHES.

BEST AFTER FIGHTING.

Sense of Peacefulness is Wonderful following the Strain.

Pte. Mounsell Scanlan, of the 5th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, a former member of the staff of the Toronto Daily News, who was with the Regina Leader when he enlisted in the first contingent, states in a letter received by his father, Rev. R. W. Scanlan, Ph.D., of the Hamilton Methodist Conference, that he survived the battle of Langemarck and subsequent hard fighting. His letter, in part, says:—

"I cannot here describe what we have been through, but our Battalion was in the thickest of it, though we suffered less than many of the other Battalions. We lost a lot of men, however, and I am glad to be alive and unhurt, ready to go at them again as soon as we are in shape.

A TRYING MARCH.

"I have just come out of the big gun zone, after a heavy march which lasted all night and half the day, the latter in a broiling sun, after a fortnight without our boots off, most of the time on cold rations, and a week of inactivity when we lay confined in dugouts to escape flying shells which, nevertheless, killed and wounded nearly 50 of us.

"This march was a severe test as any of us have ever experienced. Hundreds dropped out and they have been dropping out ever since. After I wrote the first part of this letter, we went back toward the firing line, and were under shell fire for five days. As I have said we kept under but the sharpshooters caught men outside their shelters, and sometimes the shells plunged right through the roofs of the dugouts, and that evening there would be a quiet funeral in the darkness in the corner of the garden. I was rather nerve-wrecking considerably worse than holding a front line of trenches where there is always action, or the possibility of action to keep your spirits up.

A WELL EARNED REST.

"Now we are out of it for a time lying resting at a group of farm buildings far away from the sound of the guns, in a beautiful stretch of open country. We have bathed in a little stream, shaved, rested our feet, and are getting plenty of good hot food again. The sense of peacefulness and rest is wonderful—you cannot realize it unless you had experienced the strain preceding it. "So for the present, we are contented and happy and recuperating for the next work that comes to hand."—From The Toronto News.

British Designer Dead

London, June 16.—Sir Nathaniel Barnaby, Honorary Vice President of the Institution of Naval Architects, and well known as a naval designer and author of works on the building of warships, died yesterday. He was 86 years of age. Sir Nathaniel designed the battleship Inflexible and introduced many important changes in naval designs.

London, June 15.—13,547 officers and men of the British navy, including marines and members of the naval division have been killed or wounded or reported missing from the beginning of the war up to May 31, according to announcement made in London today. Of this total 8,245 were killed.

Sydney, Australia, June 15.—Australian casualties in the fighting on Gallipoli Peninsula include 1,113 killed, 6,472 wounded and 249 missing, according to an official statement today.

London, June 15.—There have been so many rumors recently that the Allies had forced the Dardanelles that Sir James H. Daziel asked Premier Asquith this afternoon in the House of Commons if there was any truth in such reports.
