ARE WORSE ON THE NERVES THAN HOLDING A FRONT LINE OF TRENCHES

REST AFTER FIGHTING.

Sense of Peacefulness is Wonderful collowing the Strain.

Pte: Maunsell Scanlag, of the 5th Battalion. Canadian Expeditionary Force, a former member of the staff of the Toronto Daily News, who was with the Regina Leader when Le enlisted in the first contingent, states in a letter received by his father, Rey. R. W. Scanlan, Ph.D., of the Hamilton .Method'st Conference, that he survived the battle of Langemarck and subsequent hard fighting. His letter, in part, says,-

"I cannot here describe what we have been through, but our Battalion was in the thickest of it, though we suffered less than many of the other Battations. We lost a lot of men, however, and I as glad to be alive subsequent insertion. and unhurt, ready to go at them again as scon as we are in shape.

A TRYING MARCH.

"I have just come out of the big gun zone, after a heavy march which lasted all night and half the day, the latter in a broiling sun, after a fortnight without our boots off, most of the time on cold rations, and a week of inactivity when we lay confined in dugants to escape flying shell which, nevertheless, killed and wounded nearly 50 of us.

"This march was a severe test as any of as have ever experienced. Hundreds dropped out and they have been dropping out ever since. After I wrote the first part of this letter, we went back toward the firing line, and were under shell fire for five days. As I have said we kept under but the shrapnel caught men outside their shelters, and sometimes the shell plunged right through the roofs of the dugouts, and that evening there would be a quiet funeral in the darkness in the corner of the garden. It was rather nerve wrecking considerably worse than holding a front line of trenches where there is always action, or the possibility of action to keep your spirits up.

A WELL EARNED REST.

"Now we are out of it for a time lying resting at a group of farm buildings far awny from the sound of the guns, in a beautiful stretch of a. m. Rev. Fr. Cleary. open country. We have bathed in a little stream close by, shaved, rested good hot food again. The sense of peacefulness and rest is wonderfulyou cannot realize it unless you had experienced the strain preceeding it

"So for the present, we are contented and happy and recuperating for the next work that comes to hand." -From The Toronto News.

London, June 16.-Sir Nathanie Barnaby, Honorary Vice President of the Institution of Naval Architects, and well known as a naval designer and author of works on the building of warships, died yesterday. He was 86 years of age. Sir Nathaniel designed the battleship Inflexible and introduced many important changes in navai designs
