Lake Erie Fisheries The Local Member Speaks in House

Radical Changes Made in the Regulations.

A radical change in the fishing regulations governing the operations of Ontario fishermen on Lake Erie is made in the new regulations announced by Hon. Finlay Macdunnachie, Minister of Public Works.

After listening to deputation after deputation, pound netters and gill netters, Hon. Mr. Macdunnachie has decided to throw open the lake to gill net fishing outside the ten mile limit hitherto enforced. The net effect of this decision will be to give gill net fishermen, hitherto restricted to the portion of the lake immediately in front of the county in which their licenses are issued, the right to fish anywhere in Canadian waters on the lake outside the ten mile line.

The Minister in reaching this decision was largely influenced by the fact that owing to the non-existence of gill net licenses east of Port Stanley except in two cases, that portion of the lake has been a rich field of operations for American gill netters who have not been greatly worried by the Federal patrol boat. It is anticipated that now that Canadian gill net fishermen will have the right to operate in these waters they will keep the Americans out and save the province thousands of tons of fish annually. To help them the Department, it is understood, will put a special patrol boat in service to supplement the work of the Federal patrol boat.

There will be no increase in the number of licenses issued, but the gill net fishermen will pay for the greater field of operations given them. Instead of increasing the license fee, however, Hon. Mr. Macdunnachie has worked out a plan of collecting a royalty upon the annual catch.

This royalty, based upon an average year's catch, means an increase in the fee of over \$200. In addition to the usual fees the royalties are—

On every ton of fish in excess of 80 tons caught by tugs, \$5; on every ton in excess of 24 tons caught from gasoline launches, \$5.

The licenses issued in respect to the waters east of Port Stanley allow gill net fishing to within five miles of shore as formerly, the ten-mile line starting at Port Stanley.

The regulations provide for the keeping of duplicate invoice books and require the fisherman using gill nets, pound nets and seines to make a monthly report to the Fishery Officer.

Widow Sole Beneficiary and Executrix of Estate.

The will of the late Charles A. Massey, who was murdered on the 8th of February, in front of his home, was yesterday filed for probate. The estate is valued at \$84,412.20, and principally consists of life insurance.

The widow, Mrs. Rhoda Frances Massey, is the sole beneficiary and also the executrix of the estate. She is also appointed guardian of the child.

BUDGET DEBATE.

He paid a striking tribute to the Belgians and likened that devoted little kingdom to the Swiss patriot who had thrown himself upon the bayonets of his country's enemies in order to hold them until his comrades could break through. Belgium had sacrificed herself upon the sword of Germany but had blocked the way long enough for her allies to gather forces.





For instance, the subscriber, after vainly trying for ten minutes to get the number he had asked for, shouted: "What the deuce is the matter with you telephone girls anyhow—are you all crazy?" THE NEWSPAPER LAW.

The law regarding newspapers has been amended so that it protects the publishers more than formerly. Any one taking a newspaper from the post office, whether they have ordered it or not, becomes liable for payment for same, unless it is marked "Specimen Copy." Another amendment is that no subscriber to a newspaper can stop same or refuse it at the postoffice until they have paid up all that is in arrears.
