**ADDRESSING OF MAIL.**

In order to facilitate the handling of mail at the front and to insure prompt delivery it is requested that all mail be addressed as follows:—

- a.—Rank.
- b.—Name.
- c.—Regimental Number.
- d.—Company, Squadron, Battery or other unit.
- e.—Battalion.
- f.—Brigade.
- g.—First or Second Canadian Contingent.
- h.—British Expeditionary Force. Army Post Office. LONDON, ENGLAND.

The cost of a marriage license in Ontario is two dollars. Hitherto the whole of this amount, with the exception of a few cents was retained by the issuer, to pay him for his trouble in filling in the license and for holding the papers and books. In the rural sections and in small towns two dollars is a pitiful small amount to compensate for the care and labor and responsibility involved in making out this permit to marry. Now, however, the government proposes to take half of it to help the province to pay certain obligations incurred by the war.
