A BRAZILIAN **SNAKE FARM**

Serpent worship and snake charming are institutions as old as history, and so long as there have been snakes so long has man suffered from their bites and hunted for that which would cure. But it has remained for modern science to build institutions to cope with this matter intelligently and sympatheticaly and for governments to spend thousands of dolars annually that the work of these laboratories may be carried on and men be able to give their whole lives to the study of

this branch of medicine. Naturally these institutions exist where snakes are most abundant. The serpent is a reptile which loves the They are about equally distributed throughout the tropical sections of the world, and as Brazil and India are the two largest nations situated in the torrid zone it is there that are found the only two government snake farms in the world; one at Calcutta and the other in the outskirts of Sao Paulo.

There are no English guides or guide books at Sao Paulo. Everything is Portuguese; but if you have a knowledge of French, Spanish or German you can find somebody, perhaps a hotel waiter, who will tell you what train to take for Butantan, as the snake farm is called. The regular reception day of the men in charge of the Institut de Butantan is the first Thursday of the month; but the snakes may be seen any time, as they glide, undulate, climb, wriggle, push their way about in a city of small beehive looking houses surrounded by a most and fence which occupies the front yard of the new institute building.
