Issues Circular to All S. S. Workers

The following circular was recently issued by the Secretary, Mr. Wm. MacNeill, of the County Sunday School Association, and has been sent to all schools in the county. It is calculated to stimulate Sunday School work and give those interested in the S.S. work of the county some idea of the present standing of the county, and to set the higher standard to which the Association is aiming throughout the ensuing year. We reprint same in the hope that it will meet the eye of many S. S. workers who have not yet received the circular through the mails.

We as your County Executive are endeavoring to reach the Golden Jubilee standards of the Province, and as we have been organized as a County Association for fifty years,—we should reach the standards. Will you help us?

We cannot accomplish it ourselves, but with your aid and God's blessing, we are sure we can. Can we count on you to help us? You owe it to your community, to your Township, to your County, to the Association and to God.

We will endeavor to outline the work so we will better understand where we are, and what is required of each school, and be better able to work together to attain the desired standards. We would like each District President to visit each School in his District at least once a year and bring to their attention the best modern plans and helps result of his visit, and where he can see an opportunity to organize any of the Departments, to notify the Superintendent of said Department.

The Vice-President shall co-operate with and assist the President at all times.

The Secretary-Treasurer is expected to conduct all correspondence and should collect from each Sunday School an offering to assist the County and Provincial work, at least 3 cents per enrolled member, with a full report of the School on the forms supplied and forward same to the County Secretary not later than July First.

Every Township should have an Elementary Department, that you may through these reach more effectively all the Schools of the County. This department includes the scholars from the Cradle Roll to the Juniors, 6 to 12 years. There are Thirty-three Cradle Rolls. We are asking for forty. The County Superintendent for this Department is Mrs. R. D. Winger, Hagersville.

Then the Secondary Division is the "teen age" or the scholars from 13 to 19 years. At the Provincial Convention held in London, the challenge was thrown out that the Secondary Division would have 2000 organized Classes registered by October 1, 1915, if the organized A. B. C. would have the same number. The challenge was accepted. Will you help us? There were 9 in February. Get the vision of our task,—without it you are handicapped in the work. Superintendent for the County, Mr. Thomas E. Lishman, Hagersville.

A. B. C. Organized and Registered, after the above challenge by the Secondary Division, our standing at the present being 42. Should we not have 50? County Superintendent for this Department, Mr. James Carter, Springville.

No School should be without a Home Department. There are those who cannot attend, who still would like to feel they are cared for. In the County there are 12,—now could we not have 30? County Superintendent for this Department, Rev. G. F. Morris, Caledonia.

T. T.—The Standard for the Province is 1000 graduates by October 1, 1915. Haldimand reports 10. This is an important work and one which should be looked into by every S. S. Superintendent. County Superintendent, Rev. W. A. Dobson, of Dunnville.

The Temperance Department objective is in co-operation with the Ontario Branches of the Dominion Alliance and the W. C. T. U. to secure assured report of 100,000 members of the Ontario S. S., pledged before October, 1915. Number reported for Haldimand last year, 844. County Superintendent, Rev. G. T. Shields, Cheapside.

Missionary Department.—The purpose of this Department is to encourage the giving of more attention to the subject in our Sunday School. To urge a greatly increased "systematic giving" on the part of our Sunday Schools. Let the offering be made with an intelligent understanding of the real object and purpose.
