## Death of R. C. Bloye.

The death of R. C. Bloye, a veteran engineer of the Wisconsin Central and its successor, the Soo line, and a resident of Stevens Point since 1887, occurred at his home, 118 Jefferson st., at 12:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, 25 of April.

Mr. Bloye's death was the result of cancer, the presence of which became known last September, when he gave up work and sought medical aid. On October 1, he submitted to an operation at the Mayo hospital in Rochester, Minnesota, but the results attained afforded but temporary relief. He returned to Rochester in December, when a second operation was performed, but doctors stated his recovery was impossible, owing to the advanced stage the disease had reached. Mr. Bloye then returned home and was confined in his residence and much of the time to his bed since early in January.

Raymond C. Bloye was born in London, England, and had lived until next May 9 would have been fifty-eight years of age. In 1872 he accompanied his parents and other members of his family to St. Thomas, Canada. While still a resident of St. Thomas, he began his railroad career with the Michigan Central railway and in the early eighties he became an engineer on his run being from Detroit to Buffalo. On August 11, 1886, he was married to Esther A. Johnson, of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, and shortly afterward they came to St. Paul, where Mr. Bloye began work as an engineer on the Wisconsin Central Railway. In the spring of the following year Mr. and Mrs. Bloye removed to Stevens Point and their residence here has been continuous ever since.

In his death the citizens lose an honorable, upright citizen, the Soo line a loyal, conscientious workman and the family a devoted and kind husband and father. He was extensively known and popular in railroad circles and was a member of Fond du Lac Division, No. 372, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters, one son, and six brothers and sisters.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, April 28, at St. Paul's M. E. church, Rev. F. L. Hayward officiating.

The Board of Directors of the Erie Telephone Co., Limited, have decided to have the toll regulations of the last year to be sent out on May 15th, and covering local calls to June 1, 1915.

For the term from June 1 to December 1, 1915, a limited number of calls will be allowed each subscriber who has their telephone rental paid up before June 15th, 1915. This will be in addition to the discount regularly offered for prompt payment.

Four British warships are now said to be watching New York harbor.

The embargo against horses and cattle crossing the border from the United States into Canada was lifted.

In the past two months 42 robberies have taken place in Windsor. Six suicides were entered on Saturday and Sunday nights.

A fire in houses belonging to the Beaver Board Company, of Thorold, did \$18,000 damage Monday. The fire was caused by spontaneous combustion.

The Michigan Central Railway officials are negotiating with the London and Port Stanley Railway Commission of London to secure running rights over the newly electrified road. No arrangement has yet been made.

The Strathcona Horse are reported in a private cable message to have been ordered to the front, and the Ft. Garry Horse expect to be sent shortly to the Dardanelles.

Miss Roxey Milligan, an athletic Barnia girl, who is an expert automobilist, horse woman, and motorcycleist has offered for motor ambulance corps duty in Europe and will be given the first position vacant.

The Hamilton Board of Trade and Canadian Club, the Peterboro Ministerial Association and Mr. T. J. Stewart, M.P., have sent strong protests to Premier Borden against the holding of an election during the war.

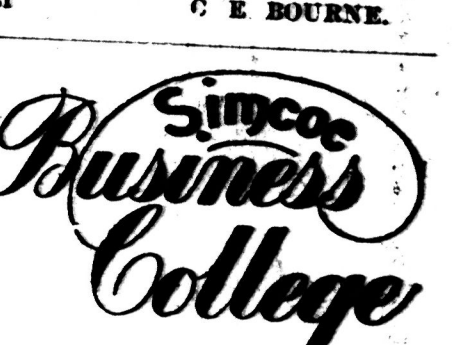

## GERMAN AIRMEN DRIVEN OFF

London, May 3.—A German aeroplane, coming from the direction of Ostend, scouted over Dover and Folkestone at noon to-day. It was driven off by gun-fire.

Lord Derby spoke at Liverpool in favor of conscription.

Belgian refugees may engage in intensive farming in the Niagara district.

Mr. F. M. Rutter was appointed Assistant Superintendent of the Ontario division of the C. P. R.

United States reserved judgment in the sinking of the steamer, Gulfight in the English Channel.

The Executive of the Canadian Manufacturers strongly protested against a general election during war time.

Sir Charles Tupper, former Premier of Canada, has forwarded to the Canadian Patriotic Fund, a second cheque for \$1,000.

Insurance aggregating over nine million dollars and costing \$309,550 during the first year has been placed on Toronto's volunteers.

The first wheat out of the Peace River Valley was received at Winnipeg.

Canadian casualties at Langemark are now reported to have reached a total of about 6000.

Toronto ministers and many Canadian pulpits paid glowing tributes on Sunday to Canadians who died in the battle at Flanders.
