Death Mrs. D. M. Allen

"There is no flock, however watched and tended,
But one dead lamb is there;
There is no fireside, however defended,
But has one vacant chair."

In the death of Mrs. D. M. Allen, we lose another of our good citizens. Always of a bright and cheerful disposition she did her part in the affairs of the village, and in the different circles in which she moved, was a staunch adherent of the Presbyterian Church and almost a life long member of the choir. High strung and enthusiastic she performed her duties thoroughly, and was of the disposition which never seemed to tire. Mrs. Allen enjoyed fun and gaiety, was young in spirit and would pass at any time for a much more youthful person than she was, as measured by her years. She was of a friendly and generous nature, always ready to lend her aid or come, at any call. Some time ago Mrs. Allen began to suffer from a form of nervous excitement, something like nervous prostration, which is becoming all too common in these strenuous times, and gradually grew worse in spite of every effort to relieve her. At length, exhausted, her fine eyes grew dim, her great head ceased its throbbing, and her soul passed away to be forever with the Lord, where the weary are at rest. Mrs. Allen was born November thirteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-nine, on the old homestead in Townsend, Norfolk county. After her marriage to D. M. Allen she resided at Jarvis for the remainder of her life. Besides her sorrowing husband and daughter, Lillian, she leaves three sisters, four brothers and a host of friends to mourn her departure from among us.

The funeral is being held this Wednesday afternoon to Knox church cemetery for interment, a short service to be held in the church following the burial ceremony.

Geo. A. Harnam is Colored Interned

Was Interned in German Army—Sightless Sold He Considered Business a Negation.

The fact that he holds the position of 2nd Lieutenant in the German Army, that he has been six years in this country without being naturalized, and that for the past few months, while not leaving the country, he has been visiting as a commission agent the border towns of Niagara Falls, Port Colborne, Grimsby, Cayuga and Jarvis, passing himself off as a native Swiss, proved sufficient ground today for the signing of an order of internment of Geo. A. Harnam, of 788 Wilsons ave., Parkdale, Toronto. But it was on business for the National Child Welfare Society that I visited these parts," Mr. Harnam protested to the Registrar of Aliens, A. H. Snow. "I am sorry, but I must differ from you," replied the registrar. "The business in my opinion was simply a guise or a disguise." It was reported that his business also lay at the back of his requests for passports to visit the Exhibition Camp.

After six years in Canada, the registrar, told him, he should be a good loyal citizen, but Harnam frankly admitted the impossibility of being this by stating that he was a German officer and a reservist. In spite of his arguments, the registrar felt that Harnam could not consistently be allowed to remain at large, and as a result Mr. Harnam, who is tall and an aristocratic appearance, and dressed in conventional mourning clothes, in striking contrast to the majority of his compatriots reporting at the Allen Office, was taken in charge by a military guard. He is a native of Reval, Russia, is 37 years of age, and is married to an English woman.

300,000 RECRUITS

London, May 18.—In the House of Lords this afternoon, Secretary for War, Kitchener, said he wanted 300,000 more recruits to form new armies.

He expressed his confidence that in the very near future the country would be in a satisfactory position with regard to the supply of ammunition.

The news from the Gallipoli peninsula, in other words the Dardanelles, was thoroughly satisfactory, Earl Kitchener declared.

COUNTY CROWN ATTORNEY

Haldimand County Loses Another of Its Prominent Citizens and Native Son.

Haldimand County has been called upon to mourn the loss of a number of its prominent citizens during the present year, and another was added to the list on Sunday evening, when Mr. John Alfred Murphy, County Crown Attorney, passed away at his home, Munsee St., Cayuga.

The deceased gentleman had been ill for some months, suffering as the result of a nervous breakdown and from Bright's disease. Many anxious inquiries were heard, during the past couple of months, regarding his condition, and it was hoped that he would be able after a few weeks' quiet, to resume his work again. But Mr. Murphy's condition did not show the improvement which was hoped for, and a few days before his demise, a change for the worse was noticeable, and on Sunday evening death ended his sufferings.

Mr. Murphy was a native of Haldimand County, having been born at Caledonia, on Nov. 6th, 1859. He was educated at the Caledonia and Cayuga schools, and for a number of years taught school at Luanan, York and Cayuga. His teaching days extended over a period of about twenty years, nine of which were spent at Cayuga. On the death of his father, the late Peter Murphy, who had been County jailer, Mr. Murphy was appointed to the position. This was about the year 1885. During his term as jailer he took up the study of law, and having passed his examinations, practiced his profession successfully until his untimely demise, at the early age of 55 years. For a number of years he was in partnership with Col. A. T. Thompson, and since 1912 the firm name has been changed to Murphy & Colter, Mr. R. S. Colter forming the partnership with Mr. Murphy. In 1893 the deceased was appointed County Crown Attorney for Haldimand, succeeding Judge Colter, now of St. Thomas, and he has continued as such ever since. About the same time, he was elected Grand Secretary of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, a very important post, but he accepted the Crown Attorneyship in preference.

Mr. Murphy had been chairman of the old School Trustees Board and of the present Board of Education for many years past. He had always taken a keen interest in educational affairs, and worked always toward the betterment of school conditions. The schools were closed this Wednesday in order to give pupils and teachers an opportunity of attending the funeral.

On the 27th of August, 1899, Mr. Murphy was married to Miss Susan Higgins, whose parental home was in Walpole, and she, together with two daughters, Misses Grace and Gertrude, and one son Anthony, are left to mourn his demise.

The late Mr. Murphy was a generous, keen-witted whole-souled citizen, whom it was a pleasure to know. His friends are a legion throughout the County of Haldimand and the whole community has been saddened by his death. To the sorrowing relatives the heart-felt sympathy of all goes out in their bereavement.

Mr. Murphy had five sisters, viz: Mrs. D. J. Lynch, Toronto; Misses Elizabeth, Jane and Maud, of Stratton, Ill., and Miss Josephine, of Chicago, Ill., also one brother, Mr. Thomas F. Murphy, of Chicago. Mr. James Madigan, of Caledonia, and Rev. Father Madigan, of Dundas, are uncles of deceased.

The funeral this Wednesday morning was one of the largest in the history of Haldimand county. The remains were conveyed to St. Stephen's church, where an appropriate service was conducted prior to interment in the R. C. cemetery. Rev. Father Murphy officiated, and the Knights of Columbus choir, Hamilton, rendered appropriate selections.

The active pall-bearers were: Messrs. J. E. Skeele, E. B. Davis, R. S. Colter, Thos. Walsh, J. C. Eccles, and J. W. Sheppard. The honorary bearers were: Messrs. J. Kohler, Sheriff McConnell, Col. A. T. Thompson, Wm. Murray, R. E. Miller, D. P. Foster, Henry Mussen, Thos. Marshall, M.P.P., S. C. McDonald, E. Mussen, Judge Upper, and Lieut.-Col. Baxter.

Among those from outside points, who were present at Mr. J. A. Murphy's funeral this Wednesday were: Mr. and Mrs. John A. Harkins, Toronto; Messrs. P. and M. Finlan, Stratton, Ill.; Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Lynch, Toronto; Dr. T. F. McMahon, Toronto; Mr. Thos. Murphy, Hamilton; and Mrs. T. F. Murphy and Miss Josephine Murphy, Chicago, Ill.; Mrs. Nellie Simon, Toronto; Mrs. Catharine Corcoran and Miss Belle Murphy, Hamilton.

As showing the wit of the late Mr. J. A. Murphy, a story was told The Advocate this morning, which will bear repeating.

The excavating for the Kinsley monument was being done, at the Court House. A prisoner named Anglo was digging a square pit for the base of the monument, and he was down in the hole, attending to his work when Mr. Murphy happened along. "It's the first time I ever saw five angles in a square," said he to those who stood about surveying the job.
