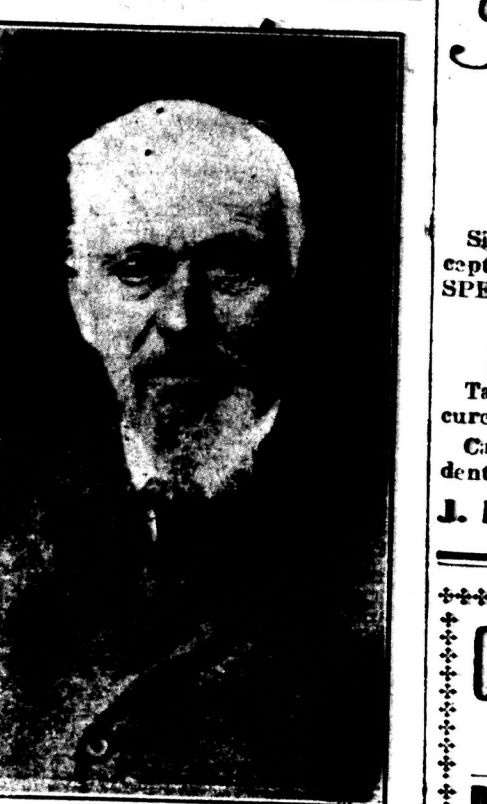

"The Grand Old Man" of Jarvis Village.

Successful Railway and Business Career of J. C. Sanderson. After 43 years of active and useful service in the employ of the Grand Trunk Railway Company and fifteen years of business life in Jarvis, J. C. Sanderson, the "grand old man" of this village, retired on Saturday, May 1st, and is now living a life of ease and comfort in his neat little home on Elizabeth street. J. C. as he is familiarly called, was born of good old Scotch stock in the now thriving little village of Kemprville, Ontario, in the year 1852. His

parents coming from "Bonnie Scotland" a short two months previous to his birth. It was in the schools of Kemprville that he received his early education, and with his father, a carpenter, that he learned his trade. Mr. Sanderson lived in the town of his birth until he was twenty years of age, then removing to the States, in the year 1852, working for one year in Ogdensburg, N. Y., in the year 1855 he came to Hamilton and entered the service of the old Great Western Railway Company, after a few years of honest toil as a mechanic he became Master of Construction in the Engineering Department of the Grand Trunk, which position he held with much credit till the time of his retirement from railway service. He had charge of much of the early construction work on stations and bridges, and was actively engaged in the early building of the lines now in operation west of Toronto and between the three great lakes. Bridges were his chief work. Many of the principal structures in Western Ontario are there because of the skill and clever work of this man. He witnessed the construction and opening of the old Great Western from Niagara Falls to Hamilton which opened in November, 1853; the building and opening from Hamilton to London in January of the year 1854; and finally the opening of the line, London to Windsor, which took place in February of the same year.

This, too, was the year of his first marriage, the day of "the fall of Sebastopol," his bride being Miss Mary Taylor, of Kemprville, and to whom were born seven children, mentioned later in this brief sketch. During his railway career as Inspector over Construction Work of Bridges and Buildings, in the Civil Engineering Department of the G. W. R.R. he was head over from 10 to 300 men. Bridges were their main work, and in their construction from piers to finish he was never charged up with an accident, or in the replacing of a bridge, with a delayed train. Mr. Sanderson was also employed largely in the experimental work in connection with the construction of the famous Sarnia tunnel under the St. Clair river. Mr. Sanderson lived in Hamilton 2 years; Niagara Falls 5 years; Stratford 2 years; Galt 12 years; London 5 years; Cayuga 4 years and at St. Thomas 3 years, afterward living in Jarvis for 12 years during his time as a railway employe. For the past fifteen years he has been successfully engaged in the Lumber and Building Supply business in Jarvis, a business he established in the year 1900, and which he recently sold to A. & W. J. Bailey, of Hagersville.

C. J. Bridges was the first General Manager of the old Great Western; W. K. Muir was the Superintendent, stationed at Hamilton; Geo. Lowe Reid was the 1st Engineer; and Jos. Hobson, 2nd Engineer in command of Construction. It was under these men of the pioneer days of railway construction that Mr. Sanderson served the greater portion of his time on the railway of the G.W. R. and G. T. R.

Mr. Sanderson's first wife died in the year 1869. His second marriage took place in 1897 to Miss Rebecca Steele, of Jarvis, who also lives to enjoy the blessings of a life of retirement. In religion, Mr. Sanderson is a faithful and active worker in the Methodist Church; in politics, he is a staunch Liberal. His family consist of—George, his
