Death of Fred Rodgers

Fred B. Rodgers, aged 49 years and well known in Kenton, was found lying on the floor dead this morning in his tailoring establishment located on the square above Krenblich's store. The body was discovered this morning shortly after 7 o'clock by his 14-year-old son, Charles, who had been sent out by his mother in search of his father after she had become alarmed at his failure to come home last night.

Coroner William Dingess, who was summoned on the case, pronounced the death due to heart trouble. Attending physicians, who were called, stated he had been dead several hours before the body had been found.

The young son after making the discovery of his father's death, ran down stairs to the clothing store, and notified the employer there.

A doctor and the coroner were immediately summoned. Mr. Rodgers lay in the upstairs room with his body on a bundle of papers. He probably suffered a heart attack, and was forced to lie down at once. He evidently suffered pain before death came, as his hands and arms were clenched and drawn and his shirt torn open at the throat.

He was 49 years of age when death came, having been born in Jarvis, Ontario, Feb. 9, 1866. He has lived in this city a number of years and was engaged in the mercantile tailoring business.

Mr. Rodgers had been suffering previously of heart trouble and had made the remark to friends at times that his heart was bothering him.

In the death of Mr. Rodgers Kenton loses one of its well and popularly known residents and a good citizen. Mr. Rodgers was a quiet, unassuming man, possessed of a kind disposition and pleasant ways. He has many friends in Kenton who are grieved to learn of his death. He was a member of the L.O.O.F. lodge, Fred Rodgers was a man who had taught and good to say of his fellow men and numbered his friends by the score.

He is survived by his wife and three children one son Charles, and two daughters, Nellie and Clarice, two brothers, Andrew Rodgers of Jarvis, Ont., and Robert of Hamilton, Ont., three sisters, Mrs. Emma Marks, of Toronto, Ont., Mrs. Jack McMillan, of Toledo.

The family has the sympathy of the community in its bereavement.—From the Kenton, Ohio, Daily Democrat, Friday, Oct. 23.

Roulston—Aldridge.—That Messrs. Ingles, Patton and Anderson be a committee on communication. Carried.

Roulston—Pyle.—That the communication relating to the appointment of a Jailor be referred to the Ontario Government to do as they think best. Carried.

Aldridge—Patton.—That the Clerk be instructed to write the Minister of Public Works to ask if the Government is prepared to take up the question of government ownership of telephones and to give an approximate estimate of cost. Aldridge—Roulston.—That we do not adjourn to allow the different committees to meet. Carried.

Roulston—Patton.—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.

Toohy—Inglis.—That the County Council fully endorse the action of the Haldimand County Recruiting League in approaching the Minister of Militia through the County representatives urging that Lt.-Col. Baxter, who has volunteered for active service, in whom every confidence is placed by the people of the County, be given command of a Battalion, provided he is able to raise several hundred recruits in the County, and that in the opinion of the Council such an appointment would be a great stimulus to recruiting in the County, and that the County Clerk be instructed to forward a copy of this resolution under the seal of the municipality to the Minister of Militia. Carried.
