Some Snake Story.

Some people imagine they see snakes but such is not the case with Heuben Sloat who has charge of the Strathgann property on the south side of West street just east of the corporation. And to begin at the beginning, some weeks ago Mr. Sloat's children were the first to see the monster. He was stretched across the stable floor when they went out for a pet kitten, so they beat it. Mrs. Sloat came to their assistance and a glimpse through the door was enough for her. The huge monster lay stretched quite across the floor with his head up in one corner of a stall.

The startled woman slammed the door shut and hurried the children to the house, then hastened to the field to call Mr. Sloat to kill "a big snake in the stable." She hurried back to the children, but Mr. Sloat never came. He was bent on work and his good spouse found it difficult to convince him when he left off work that it was anything more than a three or four foot snake. But Mr. Sloat was otherwise convinced. The buildings are so situated and the contents of such a nature that it is an ideal home for a big serpent. Mows of hay and pea straw with openings everywhere afford easy passage and Mr. Sloat saw once a tail, again part of the body or the head, but never was the monster where his whole form appeared till Wednesday evening, when Mr. Sloat was putting in his horses for the night. His attention was attracted by the action of one of the horses as she entered the stall, and on looking in the manger he saw the front part of the creature corner ways across the manger with the head buried under the grain box. It withdrew to the feed hall and as it was passing out of a door at one end of this and into a loft of pea straw Mr. Sloat viewed its full length from an empty stall. Not less than 18 feet in its vertical, at least six inches in diameter, jet black and white under-

neath. Mr. Sloat confessed that he had not slept soundly for the next few nights and he goes about his duties around the barnyard with an uneasy feeling of terror. He denies stories passed about town concerning ducks and young pigs missing, but notices that the rats that used infest the place are getting scarce.

It has heard peculiar crashing of straw in the mow of the barn when he is alone, and on the whole would be glad to see his unwelcome visitor dead or caged.

Friend of Shelley, Condemned Man, is in Jail at Simcoe

John Carr Alleged to Have Aided in Robbery

Simcoe, Oct. 31.—John Carr was arrested on Saturday by Provincial Detective John Miller. Carr, it is learned, was one of the companions of Emerson Shelley, who has been sentenced to be hanged on December 5 for the murder of Christian Shoup. The charge upon which Carr is arrested is not in connection with the murder, but with an alleged act committed the night before the murder took place. It is understood that Shelley is said to have told the authorities some things about his former friend. The charge is shopbreaking and theft, to which may be added "threatening." It is alleged that Carr with Shelley held up John Rue, a storekeeper of Wainstham Township, and took a large amount of groceries and other goods; that Rue was locked in his store at the time, and that pointing a gun at him through the window, the robbers compelled him to open up; that while the men were engaged in the theft, Rue escaped through a back door. Rue has not yet been asked to identify Carr, although it is probable he will be asked to confront the accused. Rue declares that one of the men threatened to "box his head off." Shelley, it is stated, has admitted his part in the hold-up and theft. Carr will come up for a preliminary hearing almost immediately.
