Liquor Cases.

On Thursday afternoon last before Magistrates Smith & Bourne, Jack Sharp and Michael Furlong, of Nanticoke, pleaded guilty to being drunk in a local option district and were assessed \$10 and \$20 respectively, with costs of court divided between them. Mr. Furlong was assessed the greater amount on account of his actions in the time in question, was quite sober until led away by him (Furlong). Messrs. Michael and Moses Furlong were also charged with procuring and selling liquor in a local option district, but County Crown Attorney Arrell dropped these charges on account of the lack of proper evidence to convict.

Concerning the Magistrates' court held last Thursday in Jarvis as the found drunk in a local option district "blind pig" and the charges in respect to the "blind pig" said to be conducted at Nanticoke, the fact that said charges were dropped in respect to the "blind pig" on account of lack of evidence to convict does not necessarily expell all suspicion that there were and may still be many glaring points to substantiate the rumor that a blind pig does exist in that locality even though the parties of the above cases in question are not responsible for same. The purpose of the investigation, as stated by the Crown Attorney, "knows to exist, and this to a certain extent the fines imposed will do or, at least, this end is hoped for." The authorities, too, have their suspicions as to the existence of other questionable places where it is rumored strongly that "blind pigs" are doing business and "drunks in a local option district" are known to frequent. The carrying out of the Local Option by-law is a matter for the people to enforce, and their officials are ready to set where substantial evidence may be obtained to carry out a conviction. There are persistent rumors of such places existing in Jarvis and a watchful eye being kept for proof of their existence, must be remembered there is a heavy penalty for selling liquor in a local option town. A word to the wise is sufficient. Beware!

Your King and Country need you NOW.

Do those men not know that their Canadian brothers who fought and bled at Festubert were fighting for Canada just as much as if the war were within her own borders. And their blood cries out across the seas to the men of Jarvis and Walpole to come and help finish the work for which they died.

You're proud of your pals in the army of course. But what will your pals think of you? Think it over.

The mother country has now eight per cent of her men in the field. Does that not make us blush with shame? Fathers and mothers do not seem to realize that Canada is as much in the balance as any other part of the Empire, nor what would be the fate of their sons and daughters if other of their sons did not defend them. The common law of the land lays upon every man the duty, in the last resort, of service for the defence of his country. Put it off no longer, take your place now, under the flag that has ever stood for freedom and justice to every man, woman and child.

As the war proceeds and as the horror of it grows, Canada's duty becomes increasingly plain. We ought to be on the line with every man who can go. No Canadian is exempt from service measured only by the limit of his power.

Free White Space

Newspaper publishers are asked to do what is asked of no other calling. They are expected to give twice as individuals to the various subscription lists for patriotic purposes which are presented to them, and as publishers by giving away that which is to them the chief support of the business which they conduct. Journalists are willing to bear their fair share of the common sacrifice, but they do expect that they alone should not be asked to make a double sacrifice.—Branford Expositor.

Yes, and if in addition you happen to own a bill board plant, you will be caught three times and be given precious little credit by anybody for it. "No Free Publicity" should be the motto in every newspaper office in the country. Many papers have long refused to give space gratis to anything where money is charged. But the refusal must go further. The six Toronto papers have combined to lead the way, and the press of the province should follow. Churches, societies, clubs or any other organization wanting their particular objects brought through newspapers ought to be willing to pay, if not the publisher can bear them alone to his own profit. Now is there any reason why charitable or patriotic causes should be exempt. If the "cause" is a worthy one the publisher may be depended upon to do his share when the subscription paper circulates. It is unfair to ask him for anything more.—Simcoe Reformer.

Mr. Lewis Miller, President, gave a short address along the line of good plowing, and also that plowing matches should be supported and made successful.

Mr. McLean, of Richmond Hill, the judge, gave a lengthy address in making the awards. He gave an explanation for his reasons for his decisions. He also defined the method of plowing and how to plow a perfect ridge, and also stated the work done was highly creditable considering the conditions. He emphasized the necessity of encouraging good plowing.

Interesting Lecture Muskoka Hospitals

The lecture room of the Presbyterian Church contained a nicely-sized audience that heard an unusually instructive and entertaining lecture on the above subject by Mr. J. B. Watson Thursday night last week.

The Rev. J. R. MacCrimmon filled the chair.

The lecture, profusely illustrated with lantern views, first dealt with the disease, the manner of its development in the human system, the means by which it is usually propagated in all communities, and what may and ought to be done to avoid and prevent it. This part of the lecture is truly interesting and was listened to with interest even by the children.

The Muskoka Hospitals for Consumption were outlined and much interesting information was given as to the encouraging work being done by them. The Muskoka Free Hospital was described as giving the most important because it gives care and treatment to the greatest number of cases. In it at present there are 224 patients, 186 of whom are free, paying nothing. Its maintenance means an expenditure of over \$10,000.00 per month, and being dependent mostly upon charity, appeal is made to all to be helped by contribution. A collection to that end was taken up and intimation was given that a canvas would be made as in other places.

The results of the work of these Consumptive Hospitals are to be seen in the vital statistics of the Province which already show a reduction in the death rate, and the hope is confidently entertained that in less than a score of years hence the dread white plague will be a thing of the past in this province. All may be helpfully towards this consumption so devotedly to be wished by casting in a mite to help the Muskoka Free Hospital, often described as Canada's greatest charity.
