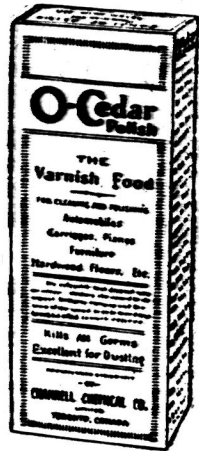

Italian Liner Ancona Sunk

Rome, via Paris, Nov. 9, 11 p. m.—The Italian liner, Ancona has been sunk by a large submarine flying the Austrian colors. The Ancona carried 422 passengers and 60 in the crew 270 survivors, some of them wounded, have been landed at Bizerta.

On Way to America

New York, Nov. 9.—The Ancona sailed from New York for Naples on Oct. 17. She carried on board 1,245 Italian reservists and a general cargo. She arrived at Naples on Oct. 29th and was due to sail from Naples for New York to-day Nov. 9. The Ancona was built at Belfast in 1908. She had a gross tonnage of 4,210 was 482 feet in length and 58 feet beam.

Germans Near End of Rope

A. J. Balfour, secretary of the navy declares the ebb has set in for Germany and that they are near the end of their rope. The pause in the war means that the successes of the enemy have reached their limit.

The German steamer, Cordelia, laden with coal is missing, and it is believed she has been torpedoed by the British, according to a despatch from Copenhagen.
