Christmas Parcel Post

League Notes Re Packing of Parcels for Soldiers at

The public is urged to exercise every care in packing parcels for the troops, as careful packing is absolutely essenin good oredr.

Parcels sent abroad require a higher standard of packing than is necessary in the Canadian Parcel Post, and this applies with even greater force to: parcels for the troops. Those which are inadequately packed run great on easy terms. risk of damage or loss of contents.

Thin cardboard boxes such as shoe boxes, and thin wooden boxes, should not be used, nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection. The following forms of packing-are recommended.

1. Strong durable eardboard boxes preferably those made of corrugated cardboard, and having lids which completely enclose the sides of the box. s.

2. Strong wooden boxes.

3. Several folto of stout packing p 4. Additional security 's afforded by an outer covering of lines, call
