This is a last appeal to British and Canadian patriotism—the final opportunity offered to every man capable of bearing arms to give his service freely for his country's sake.

Waterford Doctor Dead.

Brantford, Nov. 10.—Dr. Alfred Bowby died Monday night at Waterford in his 95th year. He was a brother of J. W. Bowby, K.C., of Brantford. The doctor was a graduate of McGill, and also of Columbus College, in the United States. He was an operating surgeon in Bellevue Hospital, New York, and also in a hospital in Montreal. From New York he went to Waterford about 60 years ago. The Dominion Inspector of factories, Arthur Bowby, is his eldest son. Mrs. Reynolds, of Waterford, is a daughter, and her son is a well-known engineer, Leo Reynolds, now at the front. Another unmarried daughter lives at home.

Interesting Two-day Session to be held at Nanticoke.

A Stock Judging Short Course will be held in the Agricultural Tent at Nanticoke, Ontario, on Wednesday & Thursday, December 1 and 2, 1915, under the direction of the Farmers' Institute Branch and Local Department of Agriculture.

The object of this course is to stimulate a deeper interest in the judging and selection of farm animals.

Good classes of stock will be provided and a free discussion is requested on the most desirable and undesirable types.

The course is free to all and will be adapted to the requirements of the surrounding farming community.

You are cordially invited to be present and to take part at each session.

Wednesday, Dec. 1, 1.30 p.m., Heavy Cattle; 3.30 p.m., Beef Cattle.

Thursday, Dec. 2, 1.30 p.m., Dairy Cattle; 3.30 p.m., Sheep.

Mr. Gardhouse is one of the really successful breeders of heavy horses and beef cattle. He is a thoroughly practical man and at the same time a good demonstrator.

Mr. Nixon, B.S.A., is one of the Agricultural College graduates, who has returned to the farm and is making good. He also has a wide experience in Dairying and is capable of giving good sound advice.

Mr. John Gardhouse and Mr. H. C. Nixon will be present to officiate as judges and to conduct the discussion on the classes of Stock.

The Course will be under the direction of G. A. Putnam, Supt. of Farmers' Institutes and G. L. Weisz, the District Representative.
