LONDON WOOL SALES. London.-The wool auction sales London.—The wool auction sales closed to-day with offerings of 7,300 bates. The selection was in brisk demand and prices were firm. The series opened with the tone uncertain, but the market gathered strength under a well-sustained demand from America and the home trade, and at the close merinos were 10 to 15 and occasionally 20 per cent. dearer.
