Memorial Tablet Unveiled at St. Paul's

Sunday Morning in Memory of Archdeacon Belt—An Interesting Ceremony.

Last Sunday, there was unveiled in St. Paul's Church a brass embossed tablet erected by the congregation to the glory of God and in loving memory of the late Archdeacon A. J. Belt, M.A., former rector of this parish. The tablet is a very handsome and churchly design and was the work of the Pritchard Andrews Co., of Ottawa, Ontario.

Rev. J. H. Ross preached a sermon suitable to the occasion and offered the dedicatory prayer, after which was sung the beautiful hymn, "For all the Saints who from their labors rest."

The sermon was based on Joshua 4, 6-7; where God commanded the Israelites to take up 12 stones out of the river and erect a monument or memorial of His miraculous provision for their passing over Jordan, and the direction was in days to come when their children asked what these stones meant, they were to be told of God's power manifested on their behalf.

Memorials were instituted to teach a principle and cultivate a habit—the principle of thanksgiving and the habit of expressing the same.

The congregation to-day were placing this memorial tablet in the church as their memorial to God's glory in thankfulness for the good life of a priest of the church given to be their pastor, and the tablet was the material evidence of the same.

Mr. Ross also spoke of the faithful and unselfish devotion of the late Archdeacon who gave the very last ounce of his strength to the calls of duty in his church.

S.S. Convention At Caledonia

The Haldimand County S. S. Association held its 15th annual Convention in the Methodist church at Caledonia on September 21. The opening exercises were taken by the pastor, Rev. G. F. Morris. The president then gave a short address giving a statement of the work in the county. The Sec-Treas report was then given which showed an increase in all departments. The Auditors' report showed a balance on hand of \$13.86. Reports were then given from the various districts.

The next was an address by Rev. E. W. Halfpenny, the Provincial S.S. Secretary, who gave a review of the events that were taking place in the S.S. world and also suggestions that would help all workers.

The afternoon session was opened by the Rev. F. Ashton, of Canboro. Reports of the department superintendents were then given.

Mrs. C. A. Berry, of Courtland, Elementary Supt. for the county of Norfolk, then spoke on teaching Temperance to the children. She illustrated how it could be made interesting to the scholars by pictures and you may put books or papers and you may put them on a large sheet show as to show the effects of drink.

Rev. E. W. Halfpenny then gave an address on "Leadership" and showed that the purchase of graft was not political or commercial or social, but personal. The highest type of leadership is Christ. There are four things which are essential to S.S. and Church leadership. First, Vision; Second, Passion; Third, Know Yourself; Fourth, Sacrifice. This brought the afternoon session to a close.

Tea was provided in the basement of the church but the principal event was a table which was set apart for the oldest S. S. workers at which 14 sat down.
