Madness Catching

London Advertiser.

It looks as though the insanity of Germany were spreading to Bulgaria. "When the gods will destroy, they first make mad," according to an ancient proverb. Bulgaria made one wild error two years ago in defying the combined power of Serbia, Greece and Roumania by her attack on Salonica. Is she now preparing to commit national suicide?

It is probably literally true that the German nation is touched with madness. There is no doubt that the Kaiser is crazy, and his people seem to have been infected from him through the agencies of press, school pulpit and army. As a writer in the Fortnightly Review some months ago observed,—

"If an autocrat is unlikely to originate the infatuation the hallucinations of a whole people, he can still act as a centre of infection where there is predisposition to the disease. He can exercise pernicious influence where another in his place might have had a calming, sedative, prophylactic, antiseptic effect."

At the opening of the war the theatrical bravado, reckless assertion and argument, frantic infective, homicidal fury and insolent distortion of the facts manifested by all Germany were noted with a certain amazement by the rest of the world. Most of those would be mentioned in any character sketch of the Emperor himself. His dementia has saturated the temper of his subjects, especially the theatrical irresponsibility of his speeches and acts, and his obsession for military parades.

The German magot has perhaps got into Czar Ferdinand's German brain. He had a taste of the Serbian and Greek quality in 1913, when the Bulgars were defeated before the Roumanians entered the fray. With Italian and British troops to stem the Germans, it is very possible that the Servians and Greeks can repeat.

Un-American

New York Herald—who will say that there is not absolute justice and the highest morality in a practice that permits Belgium and France and those who are fighting their battles to purchase munitions where they may? Certainly no American who understands the principles of liberty and freedom for which his country stands and has ever stood. The cry for an embargo upon export of munitions from this country contains not a shred of Americanism. It is not only un-American but anti-American. It is simply and solely of Germans by Germans for Germans. And just as it is essentially pro-German and anti-American, so is it inherently and absolutely immortal.
