The Toll of the War.

London Advertiser.

Total figures of the war casualties as compiled by the French war department, have recently been given out by the French Senate. From the beginning the French Government has been notably cautious and conservative in making statements bearing on the conflict, so that the figures in this case may be taken as approximately correct. In less than a year of war (the figures are gathered down to the end of June) the total in killed, wounded and missing is placed at 14,500,000. Of this staggering number, the killed are placed at five millions, the wounded at six and a half millions and the prisoners at close to three millions. The losses of the entente powers in killed are numbered at 1,735,000 to the Teutonic 3,350,000. According to this calculation the enemy has been the greater sufferer. This is not surprising when it is remembered that three times they attempted to drive through to Paris and Calais, in each case making stupendous sacrifices. Since the end of June there has been no official statement as to the losses, but in Galicia, Poland and at the Dardanelles, and along the Austrian-Italian frontier the fighting has been of the heaviest and the slaughter severe. The central powers have won territory in both the east and west, but at a cost in men that makes it far from adequate compensation. On the enemy the awful toll of the conflict has been the heaviest, and they can least afford it. Daily the ranks of the entente powers become thicker, and in time their overwhelming preponderance will win.
