Orange, Monday, Oct. 4

Council met at the call of the Warden.

The Warden in the chair.

All the members were present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

A number of communications were duly received and read.

Messrs. Pyle, McConnell and Turnbull were appointed a Committee to deal with communications.

Roulston - Pyle, that a By-law be prepared to amend By-law No. 556 by striking out the words "Until Oct. 1, 1915 and \$35.00 per month thereafter" inclusive and that the same be read a first time.—Carried.

The By-law received usual reading and was duly passed.

Bain - Patton that the report of the Home Committee be received and read.—Carried.

HOME COMMITTEE.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council,—Gentlemen,—

We, your Home Committee, met at the Home on Oct. 1, and examined all the accounts and found them correct and would recommend them to the Finance Committee for payment.

There are at present 29 inmates in the Home, and are all getting good attention.

ROAD & BRIDGE.

We, your Road and Bridge Committee beg leave to report as follows,—

Your Committee has met and examined the accounts charged to the Road and Bridge account and passed them to the Finance Committee for payment. We would recommend that the approaches to four bridges on County line between Haldimand and Norfolk be repaired by having crushed stone or gravel placed on them and that Mr. Clark have charge of the work. Also that the Chairman and Messrs. Aldridge and Anderson be a Committee to assist the County Solicitor with the defence of the bridge cases brought against the county by the townships of Walpole and North Cayuga.

At a meeting of your Committee held in the Court House, Cayuga, on August 27th, for the purpose of awarding contracts for county bridges the tender of McTullin and Runney for bridges No. 1, \$291; No. 3, \$211; No. 4, \$197; No. 5, \$182; No. 6, \$250; No. 7, \$250, was accepted. And the tender of Andrew Winger for bridge No. 2, \$540, and for repairs to Boston Creek Abutments \$175, was accepted.

We have examined the accounts presented to us, and have referred them to the Finance Committee for payment.

That the report of the County Engineer attached hereto re culverts on Talbot road be adopted.
