**THE BEAUTIFUL MOON.**  
Strange, Indescribable Fascination of a Dead World.  
For as many years as the animal called man has lived on the planet named earth, the moon has been given credit for greater beauty and greater diablerie than any other of the celestial hosts.  
The sun is our glorious source of light and heat and makes possible flowers and fruitage, even in desert places, but the solar centre around which all things within our detached universe revolve has had no such potential influence on human fancy and imagination as has our splendid terrestrial satellite which reflects to us a light only less glorious than that of the sun. The sun has in other times its myriad of worshippers, but all mankind have been in another sense worshippers of the moon.  
It is the orb of every lover of beauty as well as of the lover of music; and its strange, indescribable fascination has undoubtedly been responsible for an innumerable mania well named lunacy. "How sweet the moonlight sleeps upon that bank," were the murmured words of Lorenzo to Jessica in the Merchant of Venice, nicely expressing the effect of the mellow sheen on earthly objects.  
Another effect is suggested by Byron, who wrote that "the devil's in the moon for mischief"; that "they who call her chaste began too soon their nomenclature"; and, further, that there is "not a day, the longest, not June 21," that is capable of the devilry of "one hour of full moon." Shakespeare describes more than one kind of disloyalty as like that of the "inconstant moon that nightly changes in her circled orb."  
And so on with the prose and poetry, satirical and worshipful, enough to fill the shelves of the greatest library building in the world. It is probable, there might never have been a writer of romance had there never been a moon.  
Prosaically, the moon is distant from the earth a little less than 240,000 miles, or less than 10 times the circumference of the earth. This is very close for a planetary neighbor, and especially one so powerful as this erratic satellite, the diameter of which is 2,162 miles and its mass being much greater than that of any satellite of any other planet of our solar system.  
By what process the moon was brought into existence is yet a matter of friendly dispute among astronomers and theorists, some holding that the lunar mass was once a part of the earth, but was separated from it by tremendous tidal operation of the sun; some others that it is a captured planet, it having come so within the earth's influence as its individual orbit to be forever within the double attraction of earth and sun. Let that be as it may, in the moon we have at our very doors a dead planet, twisted and torn by inconceivable upheavals which left mountains and valleys exceeding any on earth, having neither animal nor any other life, useless for anything we can use except as an illustration of a future condition of the earth millions of years hence, and to illuminate our nights with a light magical, according to the mental and spiritual conception of the beholder.  
One of the beautiful phases of moonlight is that it not only shines upon us with the light of the sun, but also, in its crescent shape when it is "new," reflects back to us the light of earth, a faint, wondrous illumination of the otherwise dark part, which has been called "the old moon in the arms of the new." That is called "earthshine," and comparatively few who witness the advent of a "new moon" understand the source of the phenomenon, a very dreamlight emanating from our globe, and suggesting how grand might be that earthshine to lovers and others on the moon if there were such.  
The "phases" of the moon, new moon, second and third quarters and full moon, are caused by the relation to sun and earth of the moon and by the slow revolution of the moon on its axis, which occupies the same time as its orbital revolution around the earth.

We do not read of gambling houses in the classic literature of Greece, but there can be no doubt that the vice was very widely practiced in private houses. In Rome, under the emperors, gambling prevailed very extensively. A Roman would transport to a gaming resort his whole fortune—coins, papers and chattels—and, after losing all, would even seize the cloaks of his slaves to stake on a change of luck.

#### A Year of War.

Papers received from the old Country, published on Aug. 4 and later, make it evident that entry upon the second year of the war has seen the public mind beginning to awaken to recognition of the fact above and beyond all the needed sacrifice for the supply of men, munitions and money there lies a yet greater need, if victory decisive and complete on behalf of the world's freedom is to be won by us nothing less than a national recognition of our dependence upon God, and a national turning to Him with thorough going national repentance; of known national sins which enable Him to give us the victory which the righteousness of our cause deserves. This was voiced by the Archbishop of Canterbury at the remarkable anniversary service held in St. Paul's Cathedral and attended by the King and Queen. The same thought was pressed home by the Bishop of London at a drumhead service held on the steps of St. Paul's on Sunday afternoon, July 26, attended by 3000 soldiers and tens of thousands of the public. "If we are to pray expectantly and successfully for victory," said the Bishop in effect, "we must as a nation repent. Repentance is not a weak whining to the Almighty for help in time of trouble with expression of regret for the past wrong but a worthy and manful putting away of all known sins, individual and national."

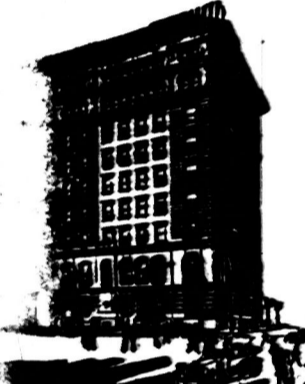
