## The Failure of the Hun.

The Hun has failed. That is the inner meaning of what happened in Berlin during recent days. And that too, is the deeper secret of the coming right-about-face, or at least the compromise, of German policy as regards the rights of neutrals and non-combatants at sea. President Wilson, with his calculated persistence, has, on the surface, saved his nation from war, but he was perhaps more the occasion than the cause. The real conflict which lay behind this change of front was not between Washington and Berlin. It was an internal German conflict, which was known to have been raging fiercely weeks ago; the conflict between 'moderation' as represented by von Bethmann-Hollweg, and 'frightfulness' as incarnated in von Tirpitz. Yesterday's report signifies much that is not told in the despatches; it is hinted from German sources that von Bethmann-Hollweg has been given a freer hand, while von Tirpitz, the Hun, is given a diplomatic seasickness holiday.

The fact is Germany is beginning to find out that playing the Hun sounds better on the boastful lips of the Kaiser than it proves itself to be even in a half-civilized world. Were there no such thing as morality, were the Prussian doctrine true that "Law is a makeshift, and Force the only reality," were there nothing to be considered except the game and the candle, it would still be true that "frightfulness" in Germany's warfare at sea is a hopeless failure. The comparatively insignificant achievements of Germany's submarine warfare as war, and the growing enfeeblement of the German fleet by reason of the growing efficiency of the British submarine service, have combined to bring home to the soberer minds in Germany the losing game they are playing. It is not so much because of any new virtue, as it is because of a necessity, that Berlin yields, or seems to yield, a point to Washington.

The alternative and the only alternative, to the more moderate policy of the Imperial Chancellor is the continuance of a still wider scale of the policy of lawlessness and ruthless horror which von Tirpitz accepted as the true program of Prussianism. The one hopes to secure peace on a basis favorable to Germany's demands while she is still free to demand not only what was hers before the war, but also indemnities for what the war has cost. The other would carry "frightfulness" and "aggression" to the uttermost limits, until Germany gained not only ascendancy in Europe, but the power of dictation on all the continents and of domination on all the seas. Both programs are absolutely out of the question for the Allies and for all free nations, unless civilization itself is to go back into the twilight. Peace on the terms of von Bethmann-Hollweg and the moderates would be a denial of justice, possible only if Britain at last renounced the sanctity of "the scrap of paper." Peace on the terms of the Jingo and the Junker and the war lords is not possible on any grounds or at any price.

The Hun has not only failed, but Germany now begins to recognize the failure. The invasion of Belgium, and the hideousness and brutality which marked and still mark the presence of the German army in that innocent land, branded Germany as an outlaw nation. That brand has been burned in beyond all eradication by the sinking of the Lusitania and the Arabic. That brand, that "damned spot" will not out. No concessions made to the United States in the day of Germany's fear will atone, in the eyes of any people who love righteousness and hate iniquity, for the crimes against humanity, against freedom and against law in the days when Germany demed it safe to defy the world.

The Hun has failed, but there can be neither peace nor safety in any country unless and until the Hun and all his breed are put in the place where they cannot even try to succeed.—Toronto Globe.
