OBITUARY

Alfred F. Jones

Many friends were sorry to hear last Friday of the sudden death of Mr. Alfred F. Jones, an old-time boy of Jarvis who was born here Oct. 27th, 1857, son of Mrs. David Jones, now resident here with her son, Mr. J. Hill Jones.

Mr. Alfred Jones was suddenly taken ill with pneumonia in New York City and hurried to the Hospital, but the disease had made too rapid a progress as he only lived over the night. The body was taken charge of by his brother, John, who fortunately happened to be present before his death, and who brought it to Jarvis.

Deceased commenced his business career in the store of his uncle, Mr. Robert Hill, and afterwards became a partner with his uncle, Mr. Ed. F. Jones, our present postmaster. They succeeded the old pioneer business founded by his grandfather, Mr. James Hill, and the business was known as Hill, Jones & Co. Before long it was very much enlarged including an extensive egg refrigerator holding thousands of dozens of eggs. Afterwards he purchased a large produce commission business in Buffalo, but in later years has been in mercantile business in New York City.

The funeral took place on Sunday evening upon the arrival of the Wash train from the East. The remains were taken to the family residence for a short while and from thence to St. Paul's Church, where the beautiful and impressive burial service of the Church of England was read by the Rector, the Rev. J. Hirst Ross, and afterwards removed to the family vault in the church burying ground.

Deep and sincere sympathy is felt for all the family, but especially for the aged mother, who so suddenly bereft of her son, whom she thought to be in his usual health.

Among those present at the funeral were,—his son, Mr. Maxwell Jones, of Chicago; his brothers, Messrs. Robert and John, of New York; also aunt and cousin, Mrs. (Dr.) Langrill and daughter, Margaret.

Wallace G. Snyder

Wallace G. Snyder was born in the township of Rainham in the year 1848 and died in Walpole on Wednesday Sept. 8th.

Deceased suffered a slight stroke about two months ago, at the home of his brother Silas, from which he gradually grew worse until death relieved his sufferings. He was well known in this district, having continuously resided near Jarvis all his life. He leaves one sister Mr. L. S. Rogers, of Hagerville, and two brothers, Gibson of Jarvis, and Silas, of Walpole, to mourn his demise.
