## A Machine Gun Section For The 114th Battalion

Lieut. B. G. Fleming, of Cayuga, and Sergt. W. N. Kennick, of Dunnville, have returned from their course in machine gun training at the Exhibition Camp, Toronto, and a Machine Gun Section is to be organized in the battalion as soon as possible.

Machine Gunning is undoubtedly the most interesting of all arms of the service, and besides showing instruction in the Machine Gun the members of the Gunners are trained in Signaling, Bombing, Scouting, and many other subjects which require the attention of their students on account of their interesting nature.

The men of this section are permitted to wear a special distinguishing badge, and are not subject to the Gunner's Ficket or Fatigue Goggles when on training or at the front; and when actually on service are only required to be in the Trenches at such times as it is necessary for them to be for the purpose of operating the guns. These privileges give them more leisure than falls to the lot of the ordinary "Tommy" and are much appreciated by those who enjoy them.

Thirty men are required immediately to qualify as Gunners, etc., for this detachment and on account of the specialized nature of this work only men of good education and physique and of a high standard of morals can be accepted.

This gives many who have been awaiting the opportunity to get into a "Corps d'elite" the chance they have long looked for.

## War Romance.

Another war romance in which a Hamilton hero figures is that of Pte. Finlayson, D.C.M., of the Hamilton police force. Finlayson, who was through the thick of all the fighting, including Ypres, where shrapnel shattered his arm, after he had distinguished himself by removing fifteen wounded men from a blazing building, was removed, when wounded, to a French dressing station. There he met Miss Marie Bloche, a pretty little French lady, who was ministering to wounded men. It was a case of love at first sight. The pair met again at Lady Gordon's large mansion in England used as a hospital. Since Finlayson returned he has been in constant correspondence with the girl of his dreams and his friends announce they are to be married shortly.

Finlayson's brother, Peter, has also figured in a war romance and married a French lady he met while fighting in the republic.

## Allied Aviators

### Shoot Down Six of Enemy's Air Craft.

Paris, April 25.—6 20 p. m.—The official communication issued by the war office to-night tells of the destruction of three German airships. It says:—"Near Vauquois an enemy aeroplane, compelled to land inside his lines after a combat, was destroyed by our cannon. In the region of Verdun one of our pursuit aeroplanes brought down a German aeroplane, which fell on Coté du Poivre, about 50 metres from our trenches. "A third enemy machine brought down by one of our pilots fell in the Forges woods. Finally, a Fokker, fired at point-blank by one of our aviators, plunged down in the region of Hattonechatel. "Last night one of our dirigibles dropped ten shells of 155 millimetres and six shells of 220 on the Conflans station."

London, April 26, 12.01 a. m.—It is officially announced that the Belgian-British lines are active and 3 other German machines fell prey to the Allied airmen. They are reported as thrilling battles.
