Old Resident of Jarvis Dies in Chicago.

Mrs. Bridget Stack for fifty-five years a well known and highly respected resident of Jarvis and vicinity died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James A. Cummins (formerly Kate D. Stack), 4227 Kenmore Avenue, Buena Park, Chicago, Ill., Thursday, July 20th, after an illness of a little more than two years.

Mrs. Stack, nee Kalaher, was born in Kerry County, Ireland, eighty-six years ago. Upon coming to the new world she went direct to Chicago, taking up her residence on what is now known as North Dearborn and South Water streets, then a residence district near old Fort Dearborn, but now in the heart of Chicago's business district. Later she went to Simcoe where she married Maurice Stack and lived for a few years, finally settling in Jarvis, where she resided for more than fifty years. Her many good qualities of heart and mind endeared her to her neighbors, and she had a host of friends in this section. About thirteen years ago, on account of failing health, Mrs. Stack moved to Chicago, where she made her home with her daughter till her death.

She was the mother of eight children, four of whom died in infancy. She is survived by two sons, James D. and Richard M., and one daughter, Mrs. Jas. A. Cummins, all residents of Chicago.

The funeral took place Saturday, July 22, from St. Mary's of the Lake Church, Sheridan Road and Buena Avenue, Chicago.

Her beautiful character and simple life, as well as her unostentatious devotion and fidelity to her family, her faith and her eloquent tribute at the hands of Rev. Joseph A. Casey, who celebrated the Requiem High Mass according to the Roman Catholic ritual and preached the funeral sermon. Other priests occupying places in the sanctuary were: Rev. J. Desautels, pastor of St. Mary's of the Lake Parish; Rev. William L. Kearney, pastor of Precious Blood Parish; Rev. Francis M. O'Brien, pastor of St. Thomas of Canterbury Parish and Rev. Joseph Kearney, assistant pastor of St. Anne's Parish, all of Chicago.

The latter three priests together with Rev. Joseph A. Casey accompanied the remains to Calvary cemetery where the last solemn rites were pronounced, and burial took place.

Organization of Resources Committee

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, TORONTO, JULY 20, 1916.

An open letter to the Clergy of Ontario:

Dear Sir,—The Clergy of Ontario have responded nobly to the patriotic appeals made by the war itself, and because of it, to appeals on behalf of the Patriotic Fund, Red Cross Fund, funds for Relief work in the countries most seriously affected by the war, and to the great fundamental appeal for men. Because of this the Organization of Resources Committee lays the following before you with confidence that its request will receive due consideration at your hands.

The government of the Province has issued a special Proclamation, a copy of which is enclosed, calling upon our people to devote special consideration and also to meet those conditions which are bound to arise after peace is declared.

His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor, the Chairman of this Committee, has instructed me to lay the work of this Committee before you as one of the subjects worthy of your special consideration on this occasion. Could you devote your special attention to the subjects covered by the proclamation, in your

SANDUSK GARDEN PARTY

The Garden Party held on Friday evening in the school grounds, under the auspices of the Bible Class and Woman's Institute, was a decided success. The evening was ideal and the grounds were appropriately decorated for the occasion. Refreshments were served from five tables presided over by five young ladies and their escorts. A beautiful 114 pendant was given to the lady who presided over the table that added most to the evening. Those who presided were: Misses Estella Pond, Lucy Henning, Ruby Peacock, Annie Westerbly and Gladys Hewitt, Miss Annie Westerbly winning the pendant.

The program was ably presided over by Dr. James. Miss Glanfield of Jarvis enriched the program with two well rendered solos. Mr. Holmes, our popular Warden, on special request, gave an explanation of why our boys in Khaki at Camp Borden are eating their meals in a blistering sun from tables of sand while the officers were enjoying theirs in tents. The sum of his address was that the County Council had granted four tents for use in the Haldimand Battalion with an eating capacity of 1000 or over. But instead of appropriating the tents for the use of the soldiers, one tent is being used for a canteen, one for an officers tent and one for the officers' mess. He spoke highly of the 114th to eat their meals without shade of any kind. He gently intimated that the boys would be justified in putting up a kick. However, some think it would be more appropriate if the County Council would put in the kick for them as the boys do not care to get the ill will of the officers. However, his address was very interesting. The Erie quartette added much to the life of the program by their splendid selections. The name and presence of Geo. L. Woltz, B. S. A., enhanced the evening as he delighted the audience with a short talk and solo.

Special mention should be made of Master Harold Hoebel who held the audience spellbound while he sang "We are the Boys of the 114" and also responded to an encore. Mr. J. J. Parsons with the usual depth which characterizes his addresses, gave encouragement to Sunday School workers. He spoke highly of the work of the Women's Institute and paid a high tribute to the boys in uniform. A violin solo was given by Miss Beam and Mr. Long who also gave a solo which was appreciated. Mr. Isaac gave a short address which was also appreciated.

Probably the most interesting and touchy part of the program was the presentation of military rings to our soldier boys. Mr. Hartly Pond read the address and three young ladies made the presentation. Sandusk has five boys in uniform. Ptes. Charles Bush, Leo. Pond, Geo. Simpson, Arthur Mathews and Charles Royce. Surely this was the right thing to do, as the boys need all the encouragement possible from those for whom they fight, that they may beat their best on the battle field.

The proceeds amounted to over \$100. The following is the address to the boys.

"To our Sandusk Soldier Boys Dear Boys:—Tonight we take the opportunity of expressing our appreciation for your having volunteered to do your bit for your king and country. We look upon you as representing Sandusk in this great conflict, in which the world is engaged.

We are living in the supreme moment of the world's history, today wealth and pleasure count as nothing, it is manhood pure manhood that counts, and in this you have surely outdone the rest of us. We ask you to accept these rings as tokens of our love and esteem for you and as an expression of our appreciation of your services for us.

We assure you that our prayers will go with you. We hope and pray that before long peace will again reign and that we will have the extreme pleasure of welcoming you home."
